Our selected team of Peeewe All Stars is not faring well this winter. It appears that there is no match for their opposition whether on foreign ice or in their home arena. Rival clubs have racked up one-sided wins in almost every contest. This has been the case at Newmarket, Unionville and Uxbridge. Although such setbacks have possibly been more noticeable this winter, it is not any new occurrence by any means.

Are our Peeewe lads lacking in hockey ability and training? Something is seriously wrong when towns of comparable size continue to "snow under" our local boys.

I honestly believe that our Peeewe are competing out of their class. I do not wish to reflect any unprofessionalism in the Managements of rival minor hockey organizations, but I do believe that Stouffville coaches should demand a hard and fast age classification before they agree to accept or invite competition in this area.

Perhaps we are at fault. Perhaps we should be using older boys. If everything is "fair and square" then I feel that something is seriously wrong with our Peeewe training programme. I would like to know where the fault lies.

He was the object of considerable criticism by the Orangeville Management.

The opposition was completely outclassed. In spite of this, the forwards never stopped skating and worked hard against overwhelming odds. The same could not be said for their goal-guardian. A continuance of his first-period performance could have made him a hero instead of a laughing stock.

NEW METHOD PROPOSED FOR SETTLING DOUKHOBOR PROBLEM

An article recently published in The United Church Observer and written by Hugh Herbison, gives a clear and determined answer to the problematic Doukhobor religion. Mr. Herbison, husband of the former Agnes Klink of Stouffville, states that though the police have through the past, taken all imaginative action including jailing, the problem is still no nearer solution and a new method must be adopted.

In his report he outlines in detail, the new method by which action must immediately be taken. It includes the appointment of a non-salaried commission of five prominent men, holding experience and knowledge of the public life in the suffering area of British Columbia. Two of these must themselves be Doukhobors, known and respected by their own people throughout Canada. This commission would be given authoritative respect and their policies adopted. An executive director must also be employed to administer constructive long-term projects and to co-ordinate all efforts, both governmental and voluntary.

A selection of workers presently employed in government departments of themselves be education, welfare and law-enforcement, must be allowed to concentrate their efforts in these districts of the Doukhobors. Mr. Herbison contends that it is essential that qualified personnel work amongst and with the Doukhobors, to determine and gradually dissolve their misunderstandings, which underlie their demonstrations.

RECORDS FALL

Clippers Drub Orangeville 26-3; Lehman Sets Scoring Record

Leftwinger Bud Lehman, performing on a line with Harold Hodgson and Lawrence Gayman, set a goal-scoring record in the Stouffville Arena on Tuesday night. The local marksman fired three goals in 27 seconds. Gayman picked up assists on all three tallies. The Clippers drubbed Orangeville 26-3.

Lehman's flurry of goals occurred in the second period. He hit the target at 2:41 and added another at 3:01. He completed the hat trick at 3:08. The three goals came on three separate rushes from the centre ice face-off. On the night's play, he picked up a total of nine scoring points. This total comprised 5 goals and 4 assists.

Twenty-Seven Points The trio of Lehman, Gayman and Hodgson collected a total of 27 scoring points. Gayman assisted 4 goals and added six assists. Hodgson fired 3 tallies and assisted on five.
