Wood Product Output From Vivian Forest Continues to Grow

The latest winter work program at the County's Vivian Forest, was outlined to county council last week. Last winter's cut of 300 cords of pulpwood was delivered to the Ontario Paper Co. at Thorold and this winter's cut for the same firm will be 350 cords.

The market for poles for this year shows promise of being as good or better than last. The Canada Crosscutting Co. has placed a sizeable order which will be shipped before the middle of March, and we expect larger orders shortly. Since December, over 1,000 lineal ft. of guard rails have been shipped to Sibbalds' Point Provincial Park, and about 800 more are presently being shipped to various Conservation Areas of the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority.

In addition to this work, which is being carried on in plantations, 25 acres of natural woodland are undergoing improvement thinnings to encourage the development and regeneration of commercial species. The main product of his operation is fuelwood, both for our own use and for sale.

Planting plans for the spring of 1959 have been submitted for approval. Planting will not be very extensive this spring as

practically all the area of Vivian Forest is now planted. The 16,000 red and white pines on order will be mainly hand-planted in areas where previous planting has failed.

Mr. William T. Managhan has been appointed Zone Forester to replace Mr. Doug. Drysdale who has recently been transferred to the Head Office of the Department of Lands and Forests, in Toronto, where he will be engaged in the development of markets for products of the County Forests in Southern Ontario.

The Committee has continued to process the purchase of 250 acres of land in the Township of Georgina which was recommended by the 1958 Committee. The delayed purchase is due to the vendor receiving a right-of-way through the centre of the property which is objected to by the Dept. of Lands & Forests.

It was recommended that County Council continue to pay the taxes for school purposes levied on the assessment of properties in the County reforestation scheme.

Reeve Gar Lehman of Stouffville and deputy-revee Cliff Wallwork of Whitchurch Township, are both members of the reforestation committee.
