

Obtained Liquor From Hitch-hiker, Jailed 10 Days

A 19-year-old Pickering Twp. youth who said a hitch-hiker gave him three mouthfuls of liquor, was jailed for 10 days in Whitby last week for driving while intoxicated. Robert Griffin, of the second concession, was convicted by Magistrate Frank Ebbs in Whitby police court.

Ronald Robinson, a Pickering taxi driver, said that he had just rounded a curve in Highway 2 on Feb. 15 when he saw a car across his path on the highway. He said he could smell liquor on Griffin's breath.

PC Peter Hollywood, of the Pickering Twp. Police Department, said he had investigated and found Griffin intoxicated. He said Griffin became ill while being questioned in the cruiser. PC Copley, of the same department, also told the court the accused told the court he had picked up a hitch-hiker at West Hill that evening and on the way to Ajax he had taken three mouthfuls of liquor from a bottle carried by his passenger. He denied he was intoxicated but admitted that he had never consumed that much liquor in his life before.

His girl friend, in front of whose driveway the accident happened, said that she could smell no liquor on Griffin's breath and the accused's mother said that Griffin had a job which required him to use chemicals which often caused him to be ill.

In addition to the jail term, His Worship impounded Griffin's car for three months and suspended his licence to drive for one year.

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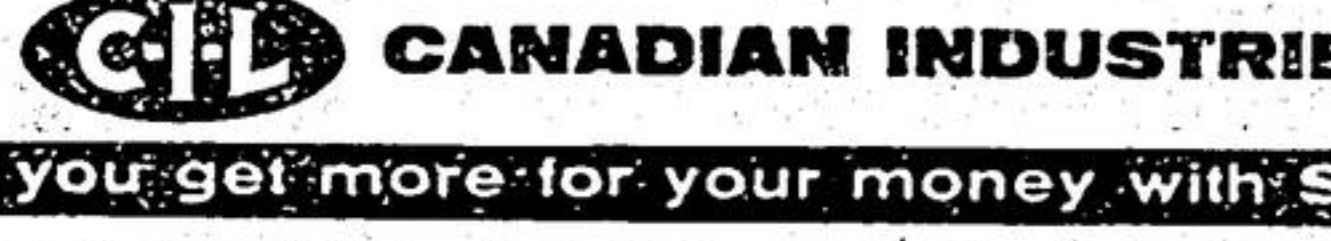
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Mission Circle

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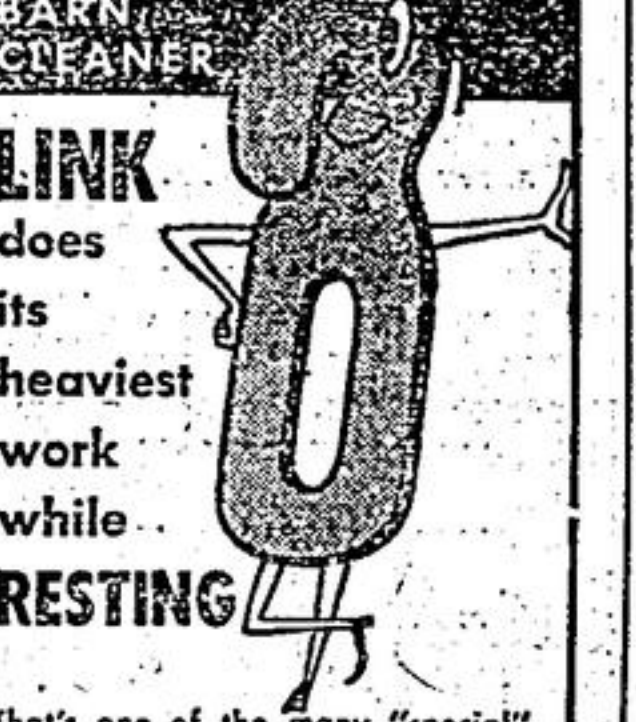
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GREEN RIVER
