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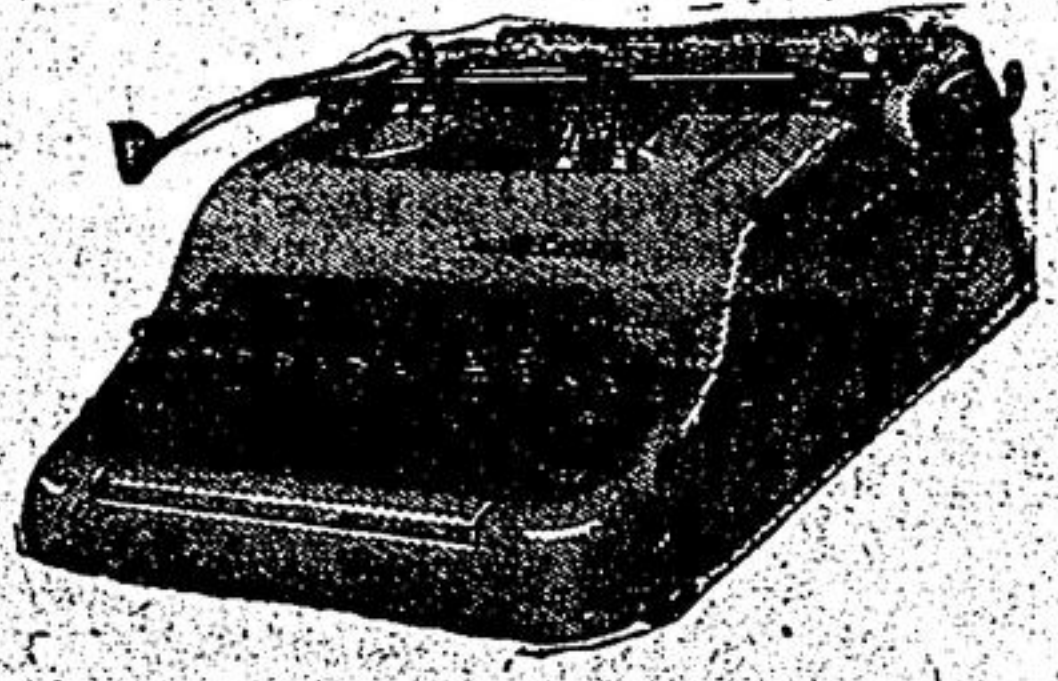

## Hope to Complete Cattle Vaccination in York C'ty

According to Agric. Representative W. M. Cockburn, the report on the progress of the Brucellosis Area test to the end of March has just been released. Six counties are now Brucellosis Certified Areas — Oxford, Prince Edward, Halton, Grenville, Dundas and Stormont. Fourteen counties are under test at present, three of these just starting their test late in March. Of the counties being tested, not including those now certified, the percentage of reactors is 9 or nine-tenths of 1 percent—just under 1% on the average and 1 1/4% of the herds infected. At the present time, York has the unenviable distinction of having the highest percentage of reactors at 1.4% and 167% of the herds or about 1 herd in 6. A large proportion of these are cattle bought into the herds but apparently a number of cattle owners are not keeping up the calfhood vaccination. That protective service is still available and paid for by the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Mr. Cockburn cannot over-emphasize the importance of keeping up vaccination along with the area test.

## Armitage, Bogarttown S.S. Affected by Annexation

Whitchurch will lose \$2,645 annually in taxes if part of SS 3 at Bogarttown and part of USS 17 at Armitage are annexed to the town of Newmarket. R. B. Hector, Whitchurch auditor, said during the annexation hearing at Newmarket Fire Hall. Both schools are operated at low rates, well below those of other rural schools and in the town of Newmarket.

According to John W. Crawford, township clerk, SS 3 has a total assessment of \$479,915, and of this, \$75,215 lies in the part proposed for annexation. The two room school is free of debt. There are 56 children attending. Four will be moved to another school if annexation takes place.

"You are using the basement now, so it will not be an unmix-ed blessing," Wm. Errington, Newmarket counsel reminded him.

At USS 17, Armitage, where the pupil enrollment is 75, at present, annexation will mean the removal of 12 pupils, said Morley Cook, chairman of the school board. "This leaves the school with 2 1/2 rooms occupied, which cuts per day capita government grant. We also suffer lesser assessment but with the same costs," he said.

## A. A. Wall Associate Rep. For York

At this time of the year when the O.A.C. term concludes, there are always a number of transfers and new appointments in the Agricultural Representative service of the Extension Branch of the Department of Agriculture. The Hon. W. A. Goodfellow, Minister of Agriculture for Ontario, has announced that Raymond Smith who has been Assistant Agricultural Representative in York County for the past year, is being transferred to the counties of Stormont & Dundas with headquarters at Cornwall. When in Dundas, he will be assisting Ed. Pearson who left York a year ago to be Agricultural Representative in Dundas.

Allan A. Wall who is at present Associate Representative in North Simcoe, is being transferred to Newmarket to assist in York County commencing May 1st. Mr. Wall served with the Department of Agriculture for three years, placing farm help and was appointed Assistant Agricultural Representative in Bruce County eight years ago and has been Associate Agricultural Rep. at Barrie for the past two years.

Mr. Wall was raised on one of the good farms in Carleton County where Mr. Cockburn served as Agricultural Representative before coming to York. He graduated from the Ontario Agricultural College in 1948, is married and has four young children.

## Butter Support Price Renewed

Dairy farmers of Canada are gratified that the government has been fit to renew the 64 cent floor price under butter. This is important when it is remembered that over 40 percent of the milk produced in Canada goes into this product. Much has been said about a butter surplus. A study of production and consumption for the last 12 years shows that in 6 of these years our consumption exceeded our production, while in the other six years this was reversed.

"A decision to reduce, and eventually withdraw the floor price under skim milk powder, in spite of producer payments, will mean real hardship to those producing for this branch of the industry and will mean less income and, therefore, buying power. This lower price on powdered milk will react unfavourably on those supplying milk for the bottled trade. Just what effect this lessened buying power for a large section of the dairy industry will have on the general economy, remains to be seen," said W. B. Rette, president of the Dairy Farmers of Canada.

## OMB Reserves Decision In Annexation of Whitchurch Twp. Land

The Ontario Municipal Board has reserved its decision in the case of the annexation of 559 acres of land from the Township of Whitchurch. The 559 acres was pared down from the original request of 667 acres.

The Board Hearing lasted on Monday about half an hour. When the Board makes its decision, Whitchurch and Newmarket will meet on the adjustments. Failing to agree, the OMB will make the adjustments itself.

Whitchurch reeve Geo. Richardson said after the adjournment on Wednesday morning, that owners of land ready for development must be considered, also the persons living on small lots who are satisfied to continue with their present township services. "I am pleased that the town of Newmarket has given the residents on Gorham St. and on the second concession due consideration by exempting them from annexation," he said. Whitchurch councillor Mrs. Elsie Gibbs said, "Annexation is inevitable, but we do not like losing the assessment or the people in the area."

The 539 acres in question include a large tract with Yonge St. frontage south of Eagle St. to the Mulock sideroad, and a strip 388 feet deep along the south side of the sideroad from Yonge St. to the second concession. As well, it includes a large area east of the town on the south side of Davis Drive and west of Don Mills Road (the third concession of Whitchurch). In the first request, Newmarket sought, as well, a built-up area on both sides of Gorham St., and an area on the east side of the second concession. This part of the application was strongly opposed by the residents in these areas, and was dropped by the town.

Hearings on the application were held on Tuesday and Wednesday in Newmarket Fire Hall, before acting chairman Chas. Yates, and OMP member David Jamieson.

Generally speaking, Whitchurch did not deny the town's need for more space, but it has been concerned with the effects upon township assessment, and

how much additional land Newmarket requires for expansion. Whitchurch would lose \$275,000 in assessment if Newmarket gained the full 667 acres. Under the revised request, leaving out Gorham St. and second concession areas now developed residentially, Whitchurch would lose assessment of \$154,000.
