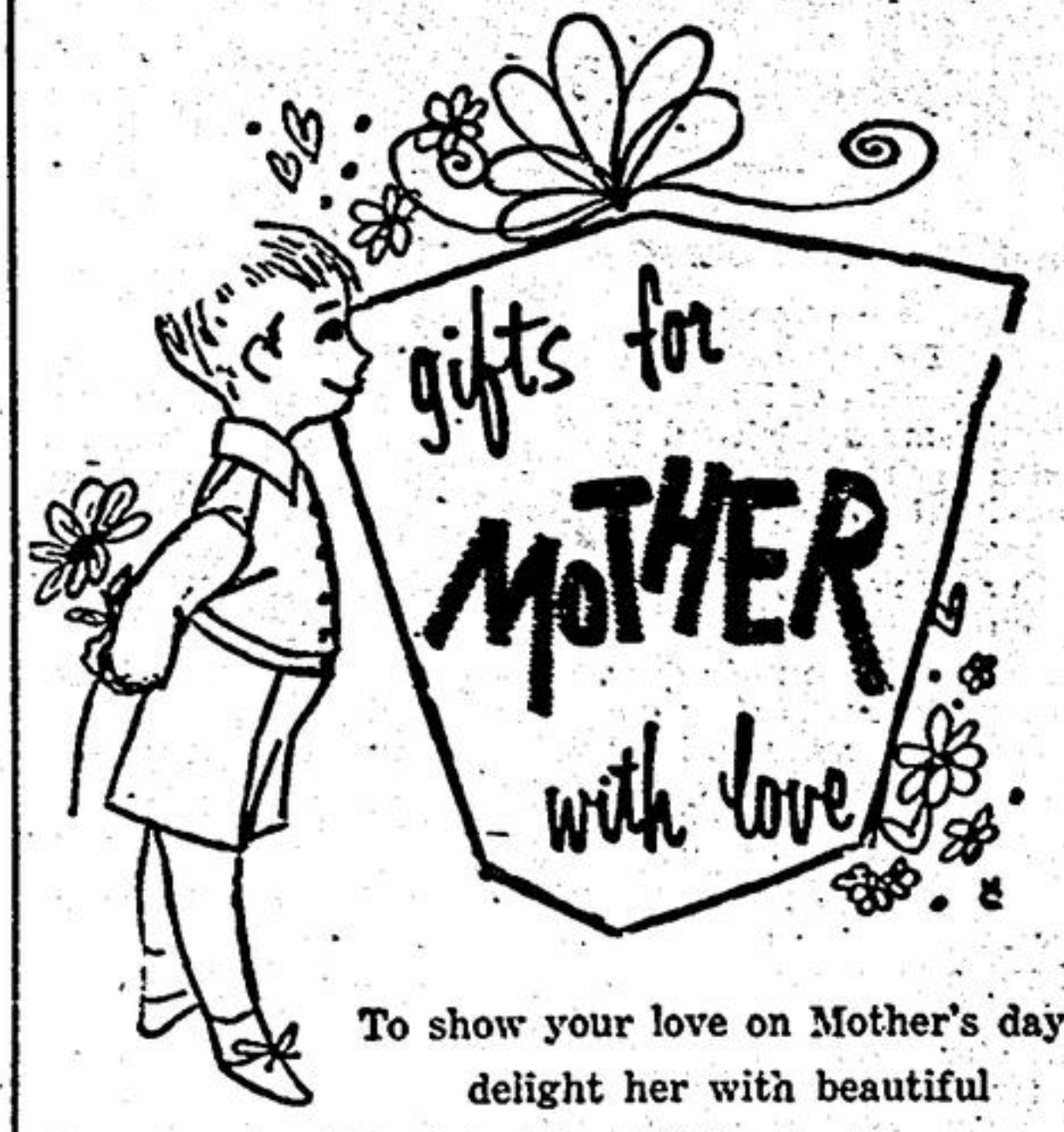
**Family Gathers to Honor Buttonville Man**
