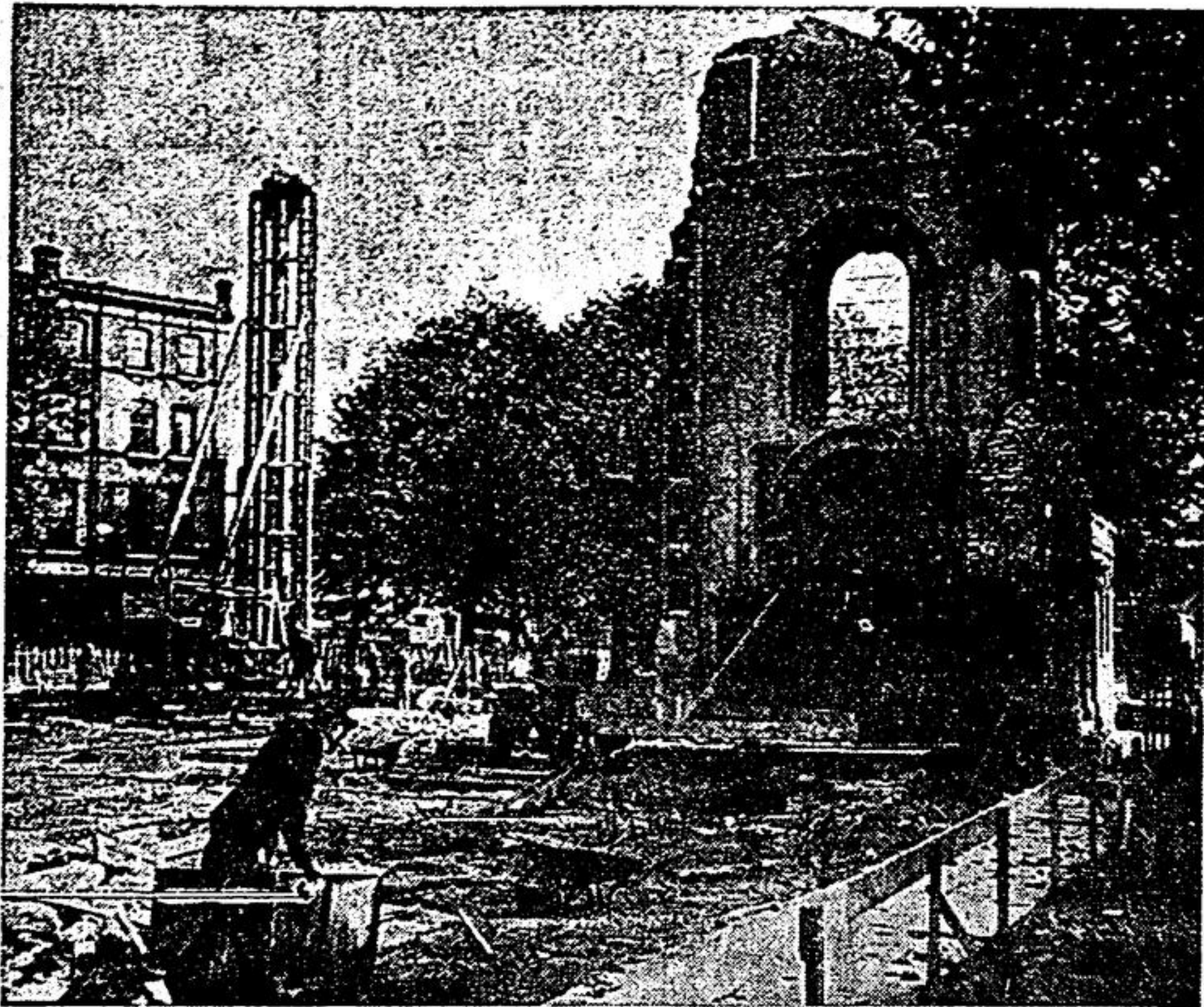


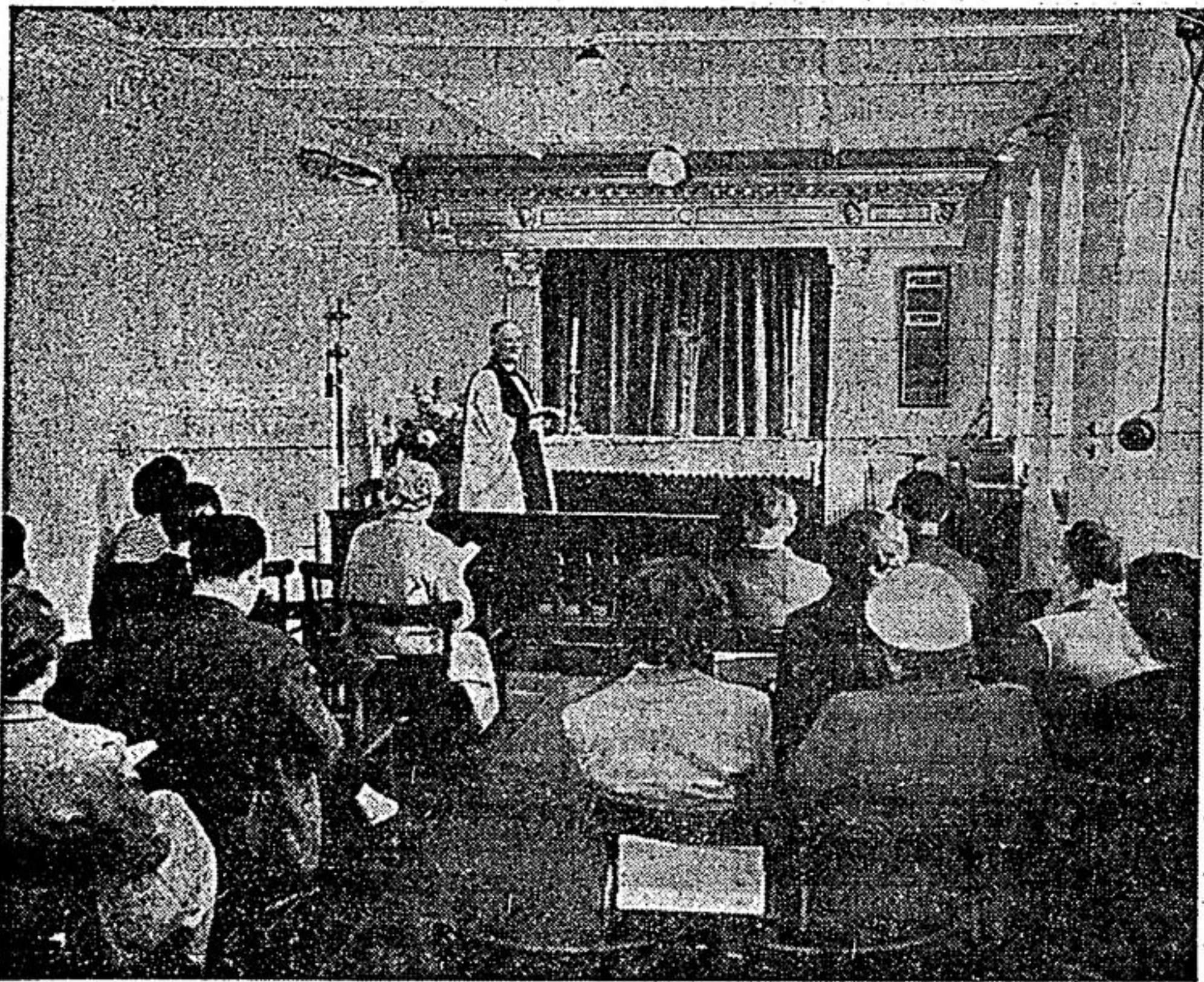

## BIG IN SPIRIT

THERE'S ALWAYS ROOM for one more in London's Congregation of Christ church even though it seats fewer than 50 persons. The church still holds services although only the tiny vestry was left after the church was bombed out during World War II. The vestry has gained the title of "Tiniest Church in Town." Despite its small size, the church invites one and all to attend services. Originally constructed in 1671, the church is now being rebuilt. The new church will be T-shaped, seating 72 with a slightly larger hall holding some 200 persons.



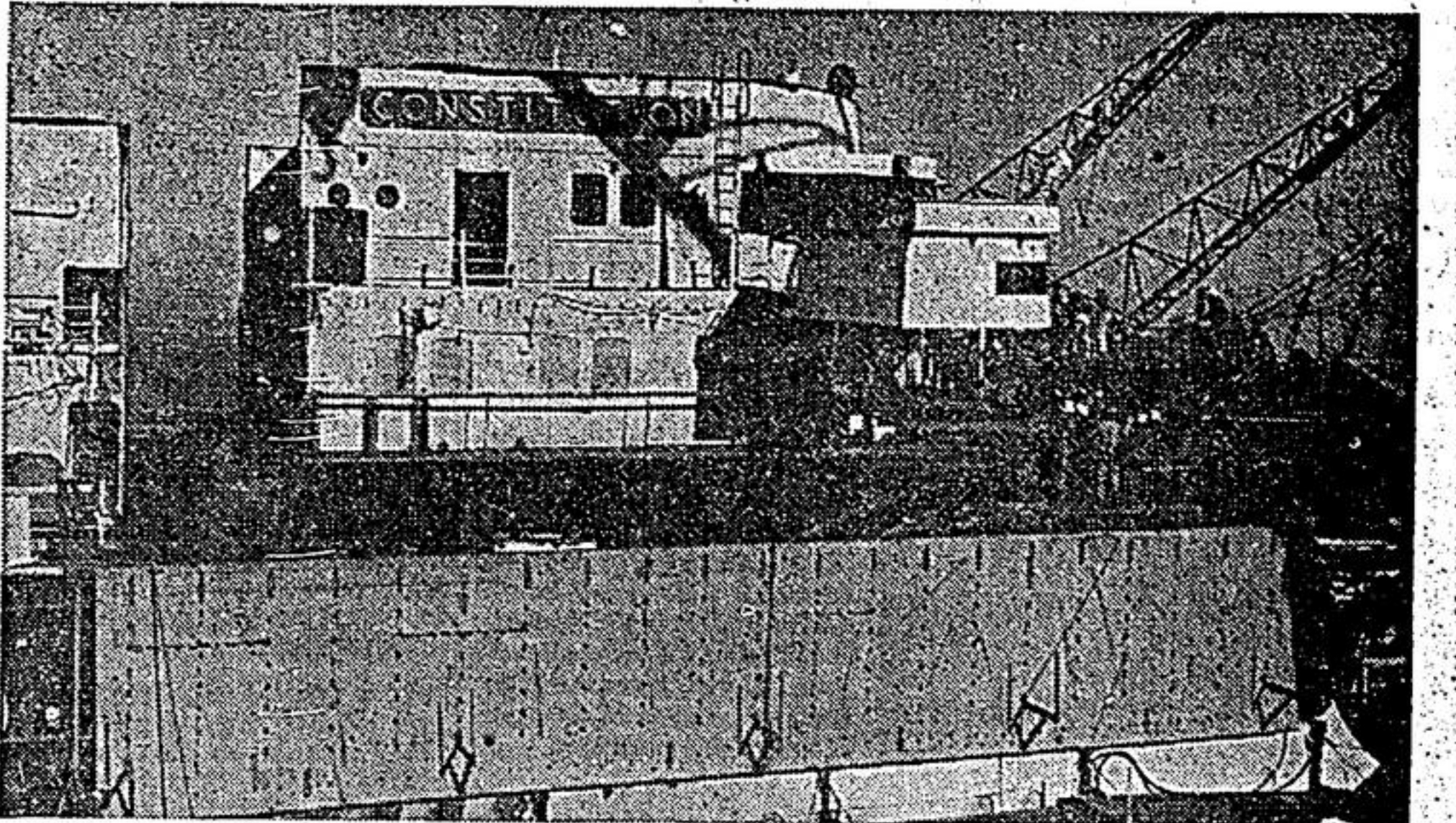
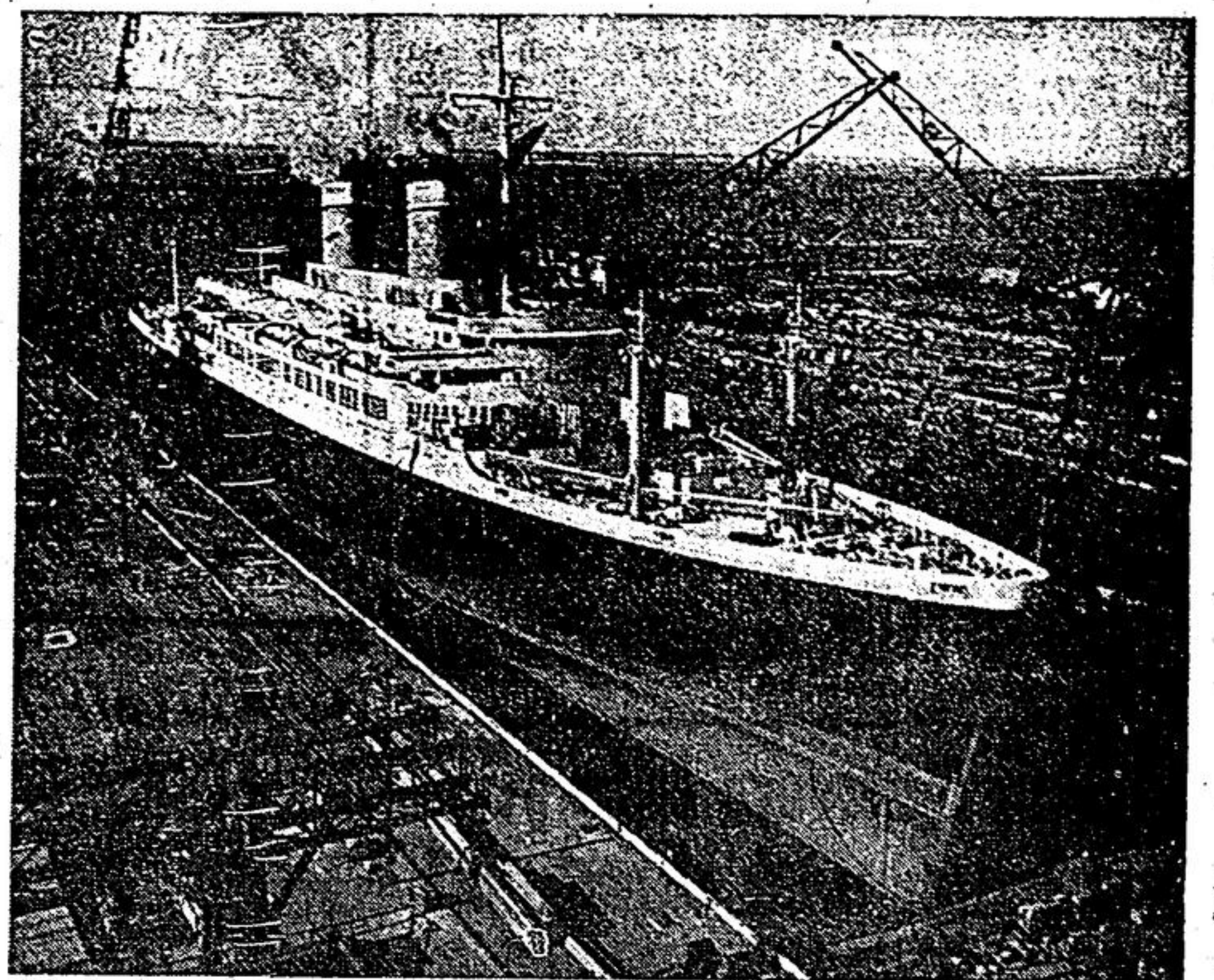
