## Helen Gayman, Ron Brillinger Sr. Field Day Champions

Helen Gayman and Ron Brillinger are the new Senior Champions at the Stouffville District High School. Both competitors rolled to rather easy individual victories at the annual Field Day Meet held on Monday. Miss Gayman collected a total of five firsts for twenty-five points. Brillinger topped four events for twenty points. Helen Gayman was Intermediate champion last year.

Roger Stover captured the Intermediate honours and Glenn Jackson was the Junior champion. Janet Hathaway topped her class in the Intermediate group and Dianne Nelson is the new Junior champion.

The three male athletes are worthy holders of the senior, intermediate and junior titles. Brillinger, Stover and Jackson have carried the school colours in numerous track and field events this Spring. Ron Brillinger topped his class in the pole vault, the running broad jump, the 440 yds. and the 100 yds. Lorne Grove was the Senior runner-up with 18 points. Dave Hisey and Bill Sanders finished in that order.

Roger Stover piled up a four point lead over his nearest Intermediate rival, Hilyard Manuel. Stover topped the field in the hop, step and jump, the running broad jump, the 880 yds. and the 100 yds. John Corner placed third with eight points. Glenn Jackson carried off 3 firsts and a second. Lloyd Graves was four points back with 14; Jim Knox and Ernie Miller were tied for the third spot, each with 10. Other individual events winners were—Don Jackson, (Sr. High Jump); Joe Olzevski, (Int. Shot Put); Allan Boyd, (Int. 440 yds.); Murray Miller, (Int. 220 yds.); R. Montgomery, (Jr. Shot Put); Warren Hendricks, (Jr. 440 yd.) In the Senior girls events,

Helen Gayman was almost alone in the field. She rolled up 25 points. Her closest competitor was Louise Payne with 10. Mary Harwood placed third. Faye Byer, last year's Junior champion, bowed to Janet Hathaway in the Intermediate class. Barb Miller was third. Dianne Nelson had little trouble in the Junior class. She bested her closest rival, Marilyn Houck by 4½ points. Marlon Byer, Susan Holobeck and Doris McKay were all tied for the third place position. Betty Ann Slack placed 4th.

P.T. Instructor, Mr. Jim Rehill, was well pleased with the results. He informed the Tribune that many of last year's records were broken by junior, intermediate and senior entrants. Last year's champions were John Little and Caroline Ogilvy (Sr.); Norm Hendricks and Helen Gayman (Int.) and Roger Stover and Faye Byer (Jr.).

## Sprinklers Compared

The rotating boom-type sprinkler matches the conventional system and outperforms the gun type in winds up to 12 miles per hour, says Mr. E. H. Hobbs, federal engineer at the Vauxhall, Alta., irrigation sub-station.

Developed to reduce labor and improve working conditions, the unit consists of a large trailer-mounted, multi-nozzle, rotating boom. Smaller models cover about two acres per set—equivalent in size to a one-quarter-mile conventional sprinkler irrigation system.

The boom-type sprinkler can produce from one-third to three-quarters of an inch of water per hour, meeting the requirements of practically all crops or soil conditions.

To avoid unsatisfactory distribution, Engineer Hobbs stresses, this sprinkler should not be operated at pressures lower than those recommended by the manufacturer. A rectangular, rather than the suggested triangular, spacing will also bring poor results.

Initial cost of the boom-type sprinkler is slightly higher than that of the conventional sprinkler system of comparable size. Pumping costs, because of higher pressures required, are also greater.

But, says Mr. Hobbs, these costs may be outweighed by savings in time and labor.

## Markham Suffers Second Straight Loss: Pickering Wins 5-2

The Markham "Aces" minus their ace righthander "Peg" O'Neill absorbed their second straight loss on Tuesday night. Southpaw twirler, Ted Matthews threw good ball for Markham until the eighth inning. A rifle shot ground ball flipped past second-sacker Mike Huggins to give Pickering's Al Hughes a life. He whipped 3 strikes past Bert White but his early-season control was gone.

Three successive walks pushed the game-winning tally across the plate. He vacated the box with the sacks loaded and only one out. Bruce Middleton took over in relief. A single and a fly ball to centre field allowed two more men to romp home. He retired the side in one, two, three order in the ninth.

Pickering's Bill Hansen went the distance for the visitors. He fired a stingy four-hitter. Jack Watson clubbed a double in the sixth for the only extra-base blow. Bob Atkinson, Al Tidswell and Bruce Middleton whacked singles. Matthews gave up only four safeties. Al Hughes belted a pair of singles. Bill Hansen and Bill Rimmer each topped out one single-base blow. Gord Found touched Middleton for a hit.

Pickering grabbed a two run lead in the fourth inning. Bert White and Herb LeGarb romped home on pitcher Bill Hansen's single. Jack Watson broke the ice for Markham in the bottom half of the fourth when a wild throw on Al Tidswell's sharp ground ball pulled first sacker, Jim Pyatt's foot off the bag. In the sixth inning, it was Jack Watson again who completed the circuit. He hammered a double into centrefield and scored on Bob Atkinson's left field single. For the remaining three innings, they couldn't coax another run across the plate.

Third baseman Bill Rimmer and first sacker Jim Pyatt excelled for the winners. Al Hughes was their most potent batsman. Veteran performer, Jack Watson was Markham's best.

The "Aces" have a length lay-off until Tuesday night, June 2nd when they entertain Brooklin in Markham's Morgan Park.

## Take Storm Pictures for Drama

Trees that are blown into fantastic shapes, white-capped waves that roll inshore to burst upon the rocks or break along the shoreline. Here is nature bending to the will of March winds and, at the same time, offering drama for your snapshots. All nature is stirring and soon there is the promise of spring and new life in the countryside.

There's excitement in the homes where kites are being made. For what else were March winds created but to carry aloft these tethered gliders to rove high in the sky and thrill their owners, young and old?

So, now into full use again come all the snapshot cameras to picture not only the awakening from nature's long sleep but to start a new chapter in the family's snapshot album.

When you are snapshotting in the open spaces, be doubly sure to hold the camera steady. If there's a sheltered spot take advantage of it provided, of course, that you can still get the picture you want.

For rolling, crashing waves even the inexpensive cameras of today are fast enough if you wait until a wave is at its crest and "shoot" the instant it breaks. And to bring out the white of its foaming cap, first slip a yellow filter over the lens.

Now, glance at the illustration above for here again the scene has been dramatized by good composition, the use of a cloud filter that emphasizes the low-lying storm cloud and the side-lighting on the trees. It's a picture you can get if you have remembered to take your camera along and a handful of films. Today's black-and-white panchromatic films will give you some wonderful effects.

Remember, too, that today's color films make it as easy to take pictures for color prints, slides and movies as for black-and-white. Yes, a new snapshot season is opening to give you a fascinating new chapter in your family snapshot album.
