### KNOW THESE NEW TRAFFIC LAWS

Effective — Monday, May 25th

- You must lower your headlights:
  - when within 500 feet of an approaching motor vehicle; and
  - when following another motor vehicle within 200 feet.
- It is an offence to place signs on the windows and to hang objects in the motor vehicle which obstruct the driver's view.
- It is an offence to load a truck or trailer in such a way that any part of the load falls on the highway during transit and the penalty for such offence has been increased up to a maximum fine of \$200 and in addition the licence or permit may be suspended.
- Passing on the right is now permitted in cities, towns and villages including Metropolitan Toronto but only:
  - when overtaking a motor vehicle making or signalling a left hand turn;
  - on streets having two or more lanes in each direction; and
  - on one-way streets.
