PAYS TO TREAS SEED POTATOES

It wasn't many years ago that potato growers heard a lot about treating seed tubers for everything from scab and Rhizoctonia to Blackleg and Seed-piece Decay.

Unfortunately potato disease control just didn't come that easy and many growers who depended on a "sure-shot" chemical were disappointed; some even quit treating seed altogether.

"We learned a lot since then," comments Ontario Agricultural College Botanist, Prof. C. B. Kelly. "The main thing being that seed treatment is effective only against surface organisms. Mercuric Chloride and Semasnan Bel are useful for treating surface-borne bacteria, Rhizoctonia, Verticillium, and seed-piece Decay. Spegnon and Phygon can be used for prevention of seed decay and they will also stop Rhizoctonia Fungi from attacking the sprouts."

"But if the disease is inside the tuber or is a virus, there is no effective control," notes Kelly. "Seed treatment won't stop

Boyhood Days On The Farm

In Old Ontario At Church Hill 1870-1882
(By E. A. Quantz)

There were no cigarettes in those days. We had cigars and plug tobacco. The smoking plug and the chewing plug. The chewing was a darker color, heavier and not so dry. The old clay pipe was much in use. The smoker would take out his plug, his pipe and his jack-knife, whittle enough from the plug to fill the pipe bowl and light up with a match. No lighters had been invented as yet. For chewing, just bite off a bit of the plug. Sometimes cut off instead of bite off.

Here's one on me. One of the boys had swiped some of his dad's chewing. He offered me a bit in school. It was near closing time, so of course I must have a try at it. I chewed and swallowed everything. On the way home I became as sick as a horse. I thought I was going to die. I threw up everything but my boots. When I told the home folks what was the matter they just laughed and made fun of me. It was no laughing matter with me. That was the first and the last tobacco that I ever used.

I think I mentioned several parties in a previous article. I missed one. The old donation party. I remember one from Church Hill to our minister's at Stouffville. The people got together and figured what each was to take. A cord of wood, a few sacks of oats for the parson's horse, (no cars in those days), a quarter of beef, a cured ham, a few dozen eggs, a few pounds of butter, etc. Also some cash donations. I remember the donor's speech. He said "Silver and gold have I none but here are a few greenbacks that may serve as well." We youngsters who were able to go always enjoyed the games as well as the supper. The ladies always had an extra supply of good eats. Any surplus was left at the Parson's.

In summer the boys for miles around used to meet at the lake for a bath, a swim and for extra mischief. There were some good swimmers, and we little chaps learned to swim. We would wade out as far as we could and turn and try to swim in. Some of the older ones would often show us how and we soon learned. Later I swam

late blight fungus in tubers; it doesn't control Verticillium wilt if the fungus has entered the tuber by way of the Rhizome; and it doesn't control blackleg and ring rot inside the tuber.

"The O.A.C. plant disease specialist stated that one major benefit of treating seed potatoes was that "no new surface disease organism would be introduced into clean soil."

"Growers shouldn't expect the treatment to carry the whole load," he added. "Other control measures that come to mind are: sow foundation or certified seed, store seed potatoes away from table potatoes, in a disinfected area, and buy small whole potatoes rather than cut up larger potatoes where you have to depend on knife disinfection or streptomycin sulphate dipping of the seed to prevent the spread of disease from tuber to tuber."

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
