Future of County Farm Awaits Council Decision

The future of the York City Home Farm, is awaiting the decision of county council, to be based on the report of a committee comprised of Warden Hodgson and the Commissioners. It was suggested in council last week that it was time members came to a decision on the future of the farm.

During the discussion the Farm Committee was asked if all the milk from the farm was sold at consumers prices and the committee answered in the affirmative. Reeve Richardson of Whitechurch said that he was opposed to the farm being in competition with the farmers who were making a living out of the production of milk. He stated that most farmers had to take a cut in the milk produced.

Reeve Luck of Newmarket in speaking of the farm stated that while the period of the first six months showed a loss, the increase in the value of the herd should be considered.

Reeve Armstrong stated that while some years in which cattle were sold might show a good profit, no credit could be taken by the Committee of that year as it would average out over a term.

Mr. Ritchie the farm manager has tendered his resignation and the Committee is advertising for a new manager. They were loud in their praise of Mr. Ritchie's conduct of the farm, but stated that due to the doubtful future of the farm they could not blame him for accepting another position.

Opposed to Any Further Annexation

In a report of the York County Planning Committee presented to council last week and approved, the further annexation of any county land by Metro, is opposed. The Committee recommended that no part of the county be annexed to Metro without a vote of the people.

Since the location of the CNR Marshalling Yards has been established, the committee asked that the CNR plant a buffer strip of trees to encircle the yards, to help conserve the beauty of the countryside.

The Committee is planning to make a study of sub-division control along the Don Mills Rd. The county engineer and the local planning boards will be asked to participate.

Dickson's Hill Rents School Accommodation

Dickson's Hill public school pupils will be attending the Summitview Public School in Stouffville this fall while their new school is being completed. The final arrangements for the renting of this accommodation by Stouffville, was completed last week at a meeting of the local School Board.

The Dickson's Hill pupils will occupy two basement rooms in the school.

Dickson's Hill has purchased a site for a new school on the Risenbrough farm just south of the Hill and will begin erection of a new school there this summer.

Ministerial Changes Are Announced at Church Conference

The Ontario District of the United Missionary Church will be rallying with the denomination to make 1959 a year of evangelism. This purpose was unanimously approved at the District Conference held last week in the Gormley United Missionary Church.

Chairman of the Conference was Rev. K. E. Geiger, General Supt. of the U.M. Church. Co-chairman was Rev. W. M. Shantz, Ontario District Supt. Both leaders expressed concern over the tendency of Christians to become self-satisfied, forgetting that they have a mission to win people for Christ. The members of Conference were challenged to return home to pass on to their respective churches an appeal that they earnestly co-operate in making 1960 a year of evangelism.

The treasurer's report indicated that the District total offerings increased over the past year by \$50,000. Emmanuel Bible College, planning relocation on the grounds occupied by the church camp at Kitchener, presented an offer of purchase for the old college building. The figure named was \$57,000. The district radio broadcast, heard currently over two stations in Southern Ontario, will soon be transferred to stations in Northern Ontario. The move is considered strategic inasmuch as missionaries are expected to carry the gospel to areas not as frequently reached as others.

Summer Water Restrictions In Force in Stouffville

With the sudden rush of hot weather, the draw on the local water supply mounted to a quarter million gallons a day and reservoirs were depleted to a dangerous level. The new and larger pumps were immediately brought into play and the supply restored, but to curb any further sudden depletion, the Stouffville Public Utilities Commission has issued restriction orders on the use of lawn taps for watering.

The restrictions give a maximum of two hours and the town is divided as follows: for consumers west of the C.N.R. tracks, Monday, Wednesday and Friday, two hours per day; and for consumers east of the C.N.R. tracks, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, two hours per day.

A new reservoir is on the Utility program for this year, but construction has not commenced as yet, and total storage capacity is limited to less than three quarters of a million gallons.

Urges Ringwood Stop Lights

Deputy-reeve Dean of Markham Township speaking before York County Council last week, made a plea for the installation of stop lights at the Ringwood corner. He stated that without stop lights it was very difficult for traffic to get any break to enter Highway 48.

County Road Commissioner Long said that any request for a stop light should be a matter for the Dept. of Highways. He said that the County Road Commission did not propose to be a go-between to push requests to different departments.

A. J. Rattie said that a request to the Highways Dept. would quite possibly receive favorable consideration.

Westend Sewers Ready Soon

By the time this newspaper is published it is expected that all the new westend municipal sewer line in Stouffville will have been fully tested, and ready for hookups by the public.

It was stated at the regular council meeting on Thursday night that quite a number of citizens were most anxious to hook up to the sewers just as soon as possible. Many had had septic tanks and faulty drainage systems. Edward St. was all complete and ready on Friday. Any entry into the sewers must be done only by permit, obtained at the town office, and the installation is inspected by the Health Unit.

Councillor Laushway reported to Council that a very bad sanitary condition still existed on Pine St. where drains from Main St. residences were bubbling up in a large pool in front of a Pine St. home. Clerk Corner was asked to contact the Health Unit for the second time to try and get action.

O.K. Final Plans

Final plans and specifications for the new municipal building were approved. The architect is Mr. A. Lemay.

Council also approved the purchase of jackets for the Stouffville Midget Hockey team at a cost of \$96.93 and a grant for Markham Fair of \$25.

Stouffville Community Swimming Pool officials announce that a special drive will begin this week to increase the family membership in the local pool.

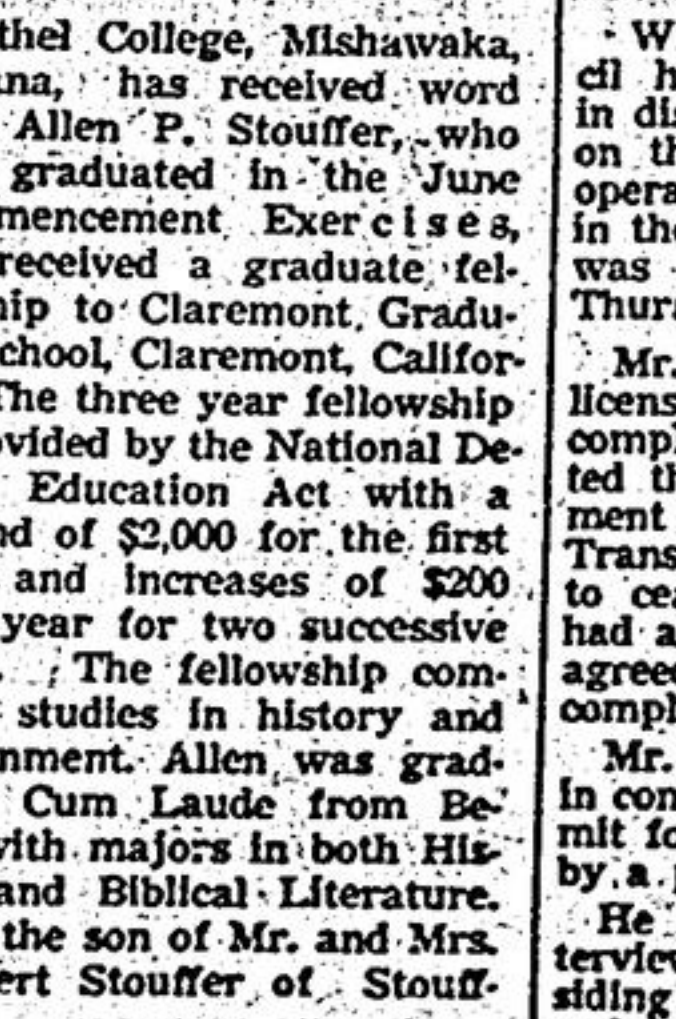
Family season tickets are \$12 and are good at any time, including weekends and holidays.

Council Not in Accord On Office Rental to Public Utilities Comm.

A resolution concerning an offer to rent office space in the new municipal building to the Public Utilities Commission brought a warm exchange of opinions among Stouffville council members on Thursday night. The resolution put forward by councillor Laushway and deputy reeve Wagg stated that council should offer to rent the PUC office and storage space in the new municipal building.

Both mover and seconder of the resolution stated that it had come to their attention that Public Utility members had expressed the opinion that no formal invitation to rent had ever been received by council. Councillor Laushway stated that he had been challenged a number of times by the public that council had not invited the PUC to rent, therefore they were proceeding to erect a building of their own.

"I can't favor this resolution when we already know they're going to build," said councillor Parsons. "You're only making them aware of something they already know," he added.

Deputy-reeve Wagg said that he had taken place between council and PUC, on the question of building, the only building in the picture was the present one which did not afford the PUC the storage accommodation they needed. Now, he said, with the theatre building taken over, we have plenty of space to offer.

"It looks very silly to me to be asking them to rent when we are trying to get them money to build," continued councillor Parsons.

"This is only an offer — they may figure this is a better deal now, and if they do not, it will be quite satisfactory," replied councillor Laushway.

"I agree with councillor Parsons," said reeve Lehman. "It's too late now to be asking them to rent."

"Possibly they should have been approached before now, but reeve Lehman is our member on the Board and knew what was going on," said councillor Parsons.

"I'm not in favor of this but I'll sign the resolution to save them aware of something they already know," he added.

Councillor O'Boyle was not present. Councillor Parsons opposed the resolution.

Circus Company Folds Lions Left in Lurch

The Garden Bros. Circus which was to appear in Stouffville on Monday night next and in Markham this Saturday, has become in-operative, according to an announcement appearing in this week's Tribune. As a result, both Stouffville and Markham-Unionville Lions Clubs who were sponsoring the show, have been left "holding the bag". Both Clubs had hundreds of dollars in tickets sold and are now faced with the task of refunding.

The two Lions Clubs held a joint meeting this week and agreed that rather than present a show of inferior calibre, the ticket money should be refunded.

Tickets may be redeemed for their face value at both the Bank of Commerce and the Bank of Nova Scotia in Stouffville and Markham tickets may be redeemed at the Bank of Nova Scotia in that town. Refunds will be made up to and including July 15th.

Failure to Move from Basement Brings Fine

Constable Crittendon reported to council that the individuals in both cases had been given ample time to demonstrate their intention to finish a home.

Will Plant New Trees

In a resolution at the regular meeting of Stouffville municipal council on Thursday evening, the Property Committee under chairman councillor Ken Laushway, was given authority to plant new trees on local streets, up to an expenditure of \$100.

The chairman said that quite a number of trees were being removed. Many of them had died and others were so denuded of their branches as to be of little beauty or use.

Citizens regret to see our trees cut down and council will try to replace at suitable locations. New trees to be planted will be red or silver maple.

Numbering Survey Nears Completion

The survey being done by the Municipal Services Co. in preparation to placing street numbers on every building in Stouffville, is nearing completion. Work was going ahead last week ready for the drawing of maps and the public will be notified when to expect the numbering crew in town.

The system of numbering provides a number for every twenty feet thus taking care of double houses, narrow commercial frontages, etc. Once completed the company keeps the system up-to-date so far as new subdivision and new individual buildings are concerned.

The numbering will fill a need in town that has been felt for some time, and make much easier the locating of residents, and delivery of goods.

Councillor Mrs. Gibb Calls for Action on Wrecking Yd. Permits

Whitchurch Township council has spent considerable time in discussion at recent meetings on the requests for permits to operate wrecking yards within the municipality. The matter was again on the agenda at Thursday night's meeting.

Mr. Hineman who had his license withheld pending his complying with the bylaw, stated that the Provincial Government officers of the Dept. of Transport had called on him to cease operation unless he had a township permit. Council agreed to review his case if he complied with the requirements.

Mr. Cappe spoke to council in connection with his yard, permitted for which had been blocked by a petition of 21 ratepayers.

He told council he had interviewed those persons residing in the immediate area and had found that they were not opposed, providing that he did not burn any materials at his property.
