From the consumer's point of view, there is little to choose between them though the plastic box appears more attractive and for that reason may become increasingly popular. New master containers of corrugated cardboard result in less crushing of the fruit and so are being used more extensively this year.

Much-needed rain, which broke the recent heat wave and was followed by cool weather, may have slowed the Ontario Strawberry crop slightly but resulted in a better quality fruit, well worth waiting for.

Besides strawberries, many Ontario-grown vegetables are now arriving in quantities at the Ontario Food Terminal, for distribution to retail outlets throughout the province. Early cabbage, cauliflower, and let tuce are arriving in from all areas. Fresh, new-bunched car rots and beets, both green and yellow beans are in good supply. Field cucumbers, too, are rapidly becoming plentiful.

Added to the fact that large quantities of local hot house tomatoes are available for contrasting color, the approaching July Salad Month should find Ontario fully prepared for excellent eating.

STRAWBERRY JELLY 3% cups juice (about 21/2 quarts ripe berries) 714 cups (31/2 lbs.) sugar H cup strained lemon juice 1 bottle Certo fruit pectin
