Strawberries, Early Vegetables In Plentiful Supply

Local strawberries, which began arriving at the Ontario Food Terminal in Toronto last week, should be in good supply now. All main growing areas, Simcoe, Niagara and Southwest Ontario, are shipping these luscious, red berries in quantity and local dealers will already have switched from imported to home-grown varieties.

This year's crop is expected to be of average size and good quality, so that there should be an ample supply, both for table use fresh and for strawberry shortcake unlimited, according to D. E. Williams of the Farm Products Inspection Service, Ontario Department of Agriculture.

Long-familiar pint and quart containers come in both wood and plastic nowadays. From the consumer's point of view, there is little to choose between them though the plastic box appears more attractive and for that reason may become increasingly popular.

Much-needed rain, which broke the recent heat wave and was followed by cool weather, may have slowed the Ontario Strawberry crop slightly but resulted in a better quality fruit, well worth waiting for.

Besides strawberries, many Ontario-grown vegetables are now arriving in quantities at the Ontario Food Terminal, for distribution to retail outlets throughout the province.

Added to the fact that large quantities of local hot house tomatoes are available for contrasting color, the approaching July Salad Month should find Ontario fully prepared for excellent eating.

THE PRESERVING KETTLE by Frances Barton of GENERAL FOODS KITCHENS

If your family likes Strawberry Jam they'll enjoy Strawberry Jelly too. Here's the successful way to make it.

STRAWBERRY JELLY 3 1/2 cups juice (about 2 1/2 quarts fresh berries) 7 1/2 cups (3 1/2 lbs.) sugar 1/2 cup strained lemon juice 1 bottle Certo fruit pectin

To prepare juice. Crush thoroughly about 2 1/2 quarts fully ripe berries. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 3 1/2 cups juice and 1/2 cup lemon juice into a very large saucepan. To make jelly. To the measured juice in saucepan, add 7 1/2 cups sugar and mix well. Place over high heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. At once stir in Certo. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim off foam with metal spoon and pour quickly into glasses. Cover at once with 1/2 inch hot paraffin. Makes about 11 medium glasses.
