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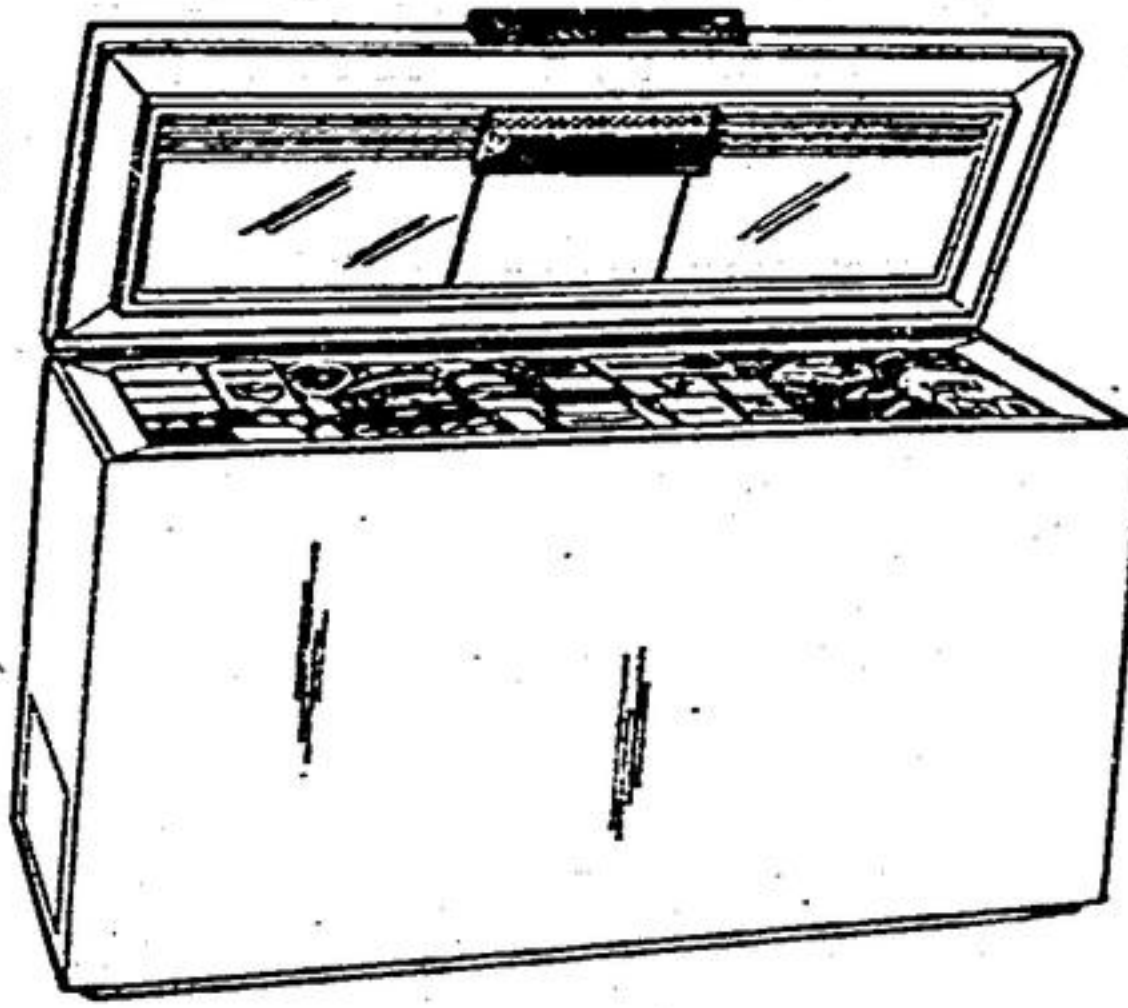

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## Consider Dispensing of Small Parks

The Property Committee of Stouffville Council has been authorized to investigate the sale of at least two small park areas, taken during subdividing. Councillor Parsons pointed out that it will cost the town money to maintain these small plots. He said that already complaints had been received that weeds were growing, and furthermore the lots were not suitably located for parks.

If they could be sold, the money so derived could be drawing interest, and the municipality would be receiving taxes from the properties as well. The money, it was stated, would have to be held for the purchase of a larger park area, better situated, or the addition of land to the present Memorial Park. The two saleable areas under consideration are, lots on Fairview at the rear of the Legion Hall, and lots on Maytree Ave. in the Hawtin subdivision. The park area at the corner of West Lawn Cres. and Rupert, was believed needed for residents of that area, and was larger, to be of more playground value.
