

# Girls Trounce E. York 23-3; D. Jarvis Clouts 3-Run Homer

Stouffville catcher, Doreen Jarvis continues to belt long balls to all corners of the park. On Wednesday night, the agile battery mate kept her home run streak alive by socking a three-run circuit clout into deep left field. The four-base drive pushed front-runners, Audrey Muri-son and Mavis Trunk across the plate. Stouffville went on to crush East York "Kiwans" 23-3 in a scheduled league contest. The game was halted at the end of the fifth inning.

Doreen Jarvis and team-mate Marion Gayman enjoyed a field day at the plate for Stouffville. They pounced on the offerings of two East York pitchers and smashed out a total of eight hits. Both players each bagged three singles and a home run in five times at bat. Mavis Trunk was again parked on base when Marion Gayman unleashed her circuit blow. Leadoff batter, Audrey Muri-son raised her average with three hits. Mavis Trunk, Ila Redshaw, Lorraine Holdsworth and Jean Pipher each contributed two safeties. Donna Seebeck, Joyce Roberts and pinch-hitter, Lenore Loyst had one hit apiece.

Claremont's Ila Redshaw is rapidly making her presence known both to her team mates and to the rest of the league. On Wednesday night she belted three long balls. One clout was hauled down in deep centerfield. She tagged a double in the first inning and slammed a triple in the fifth. In the fourth, she drove a liner that was gloved by the first baseman. Infield speedster, Mavis Trunk beat out a neat bunt single in the third. She completed a fine defensive play in the second when she grabbed a line drive shot from the bat of Brenda Woodhouse. Jean Halstead had little trouble with the East York opposition. She held the visitors to five hits. She was given fine support, both in the field and at the plate. She aided her own cause by banging out a pair of single-base blows. Collectively, Stouffville counted a total of 22 hits.

# Laurie Team Quits Game: Umpire Assaulted by Player

**Eckardt Slams 3-Run Homer**  
A clowning Toronto Junior team suddenly turned sour in the dying innings of an exhibition baseball game with the Stouffville Cardinals on Tuesday night and walked off the diamond. Stouffville were at bat in the bottom half of the 8th inning when the fireworks erupted in a disgraceful exhibition of unsportsmanlike conduct. The flare-up was similar to the mid-game episode with Agincourt two years ago. This time, however, no Stouffville players or spectators were involved. The visitors, Doug Laurie Jr., held a tight 8-7 lead when the contest came to a sudden halt. Catcher Jim Lightfoot was the main centre of attraction. He was ejected from the game by plate umpire Len Buckland when he loudly protested two calls made by the official.

**Hurls Abuse and Equipment**  
The Leaside catcher unleashed a volley of verbal abuse at umpire Buckland when waved out of the game. After throwing the ball at the official, he elected to toss each piece of equipment in the general direction of the well-padded Buckland. When finally restrained by other more genial members of the club, he informed his Coach that his name could be scratched from the roster. Four Leaside players apologized for the incident. The Coach argued that with the ousting of his catcher, he could no longer field a full team. One other player was ejected in the seventh inning.

**Contrasting Moods**  
In the early innings, the Toronto boys acted like participants in a three-ring circus. They "clowned" in the field, on the base paths and at the plate. When starter, Jerry Wilks, was knocked out of the box in the fourth inning, after mowing down his rivals in order in the first, the entire complexion of the game took a sudden, sober turn. A seven run outburst by Leaside in the sixth gave reliever, Dave Wright, a good margin to work on. He was yanked in the eighth in favour of a southpaw twirler and a base on balls put the would-be tying run on first base. He, never completed the circuit, for eight Toronto players followed their ousted catcher to the showers. A good crowd watched the pre-playoff exhibition tilt.

**Belts Home Run Blast**  
The feature hit of the game was a giant home run blast from the big bat of Stouffville's Gord Eckardt. The four base clout came in the second inning with team mates, Bob Stover and Harry Barber parked on the sacks. Stover poked out a single and Barber followed through with a ringing double into centerfield. This set the stage for Eckardt's drive. It cleared the centerfield fence by six feet and landed on the roadway that skirts the park. The six-bagger put the Cards over front 3-1. They held this advantage until the seventh when two hits, two walks, three errors put the Toronto crew ahead 8-4. Stouffville roared back with three tallies in their half of the seventh but were robbed of a chance in the eighth.

**Barber Hurls and Hits**  
Harry Barber was in mid-season form. Although clipped for 11 hits, he held the opposition off the score sheet for six of their eight innings. He struck out four and walked four. In addition to his hurling prowess, he banged out three hits in four times at bat. He bagged doubles in the second and seventh and a single in the sixth. Rookie Roger Todd belted a pair of singles. Bob Stover and Lynn Taylor each had one.

# Brooklin Wins Game As Umpire Jostled; Player Quits Contest

The air in the Brougham Community Park was electric with excitement and tension on Friday night when the homesters tangled with Brooklin in one of the most hectic softball contests of the current South Ontario League schedule. At one point in the game the plate umpire left his post to break up a threatened skirmish as Brougham players ganged up on the base official. Ivan Booth, one of Brougham's most potent batsmen, threw his glove into the stands and left the game. He was later ordered out of the park by the umpire when he continued to heckle the official from the bench. He declined to leave although the umpire threatened to award the contest to Brooklin.

**Bases-Loaded Home Run**  
The anti-umpire schmolze started after Brougham's third-sacker, Rae Ellicott slammed a towering home run into deep left field with 3 men on base. Although his 300 ft. blast cleared the sacks with ease, he was later ruled out for failing to touch second base. The decision brought a storm of protest from the Brougham bench. To add insult to injury, coach Bill Harper of Brooklin charged that only two, and not three runs should score. When the umpire did not agree, Harper immediately announced that the game was being played under protest. Brooklin later rallied to win handily by a score of 10-4.

**Tagged at Third**  
The straw that broke Brougham's back came on a play at third base. Doug Mitchell of Brooklin doubled and streaked for third on an over throw to the bag. Rae Ellicott retrieved the ball and Glenn Carter put the tag on the runner. The base umpire called him out. The plate official over-ruled the decision, claiming the ball was out of play. Brougham players once again poured onto the field. Rae Ellicott had to be restrained by his mates. Booth threw and kicked his glove across the entire diamond. He kept on walking—right out of the game. A number of timely hits and three errors extended Brooklin's lead into the double figures. It was Brooklin's eighth win against 5 defeats. 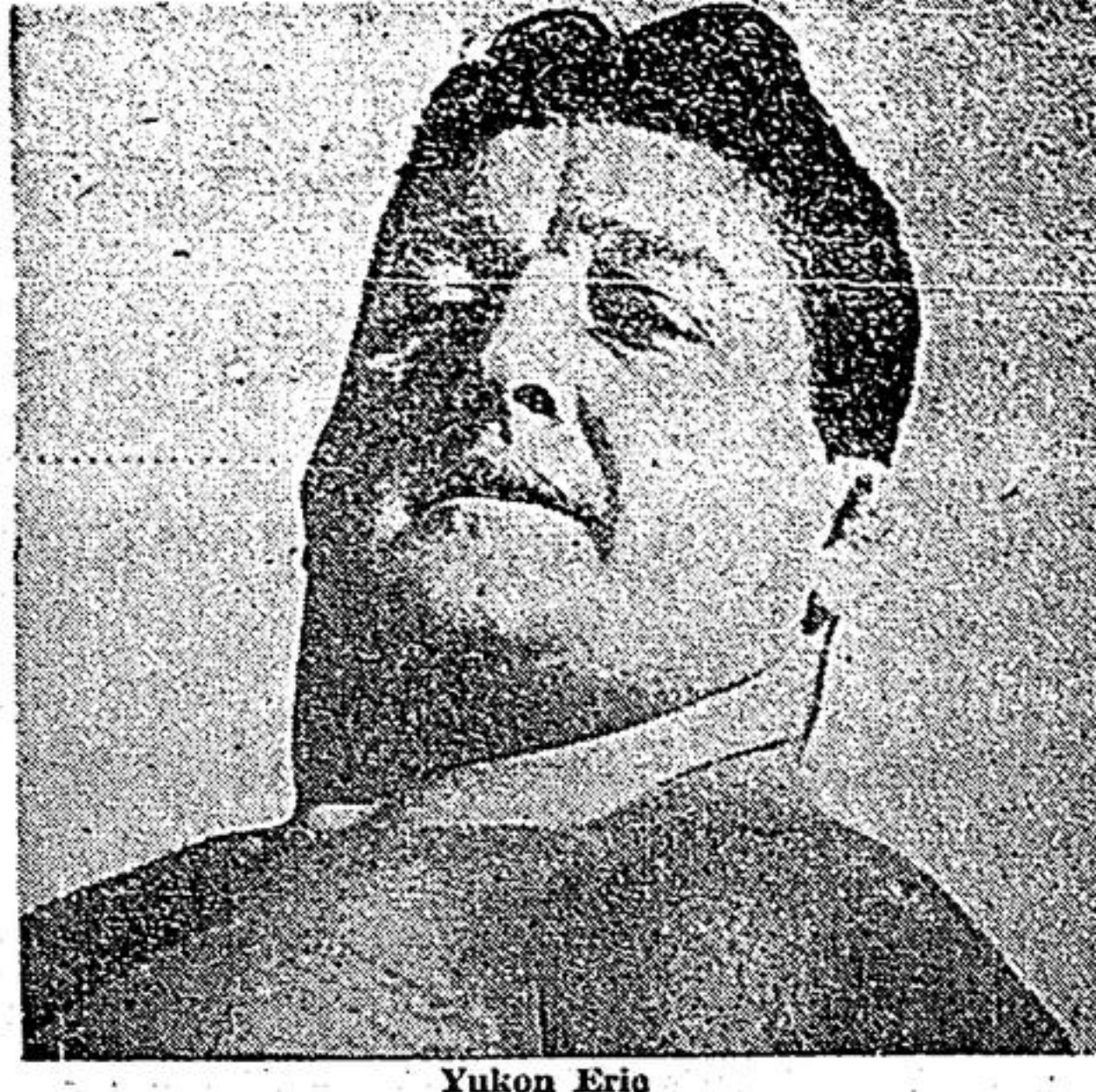
# Donkeys At Claremont Sat.

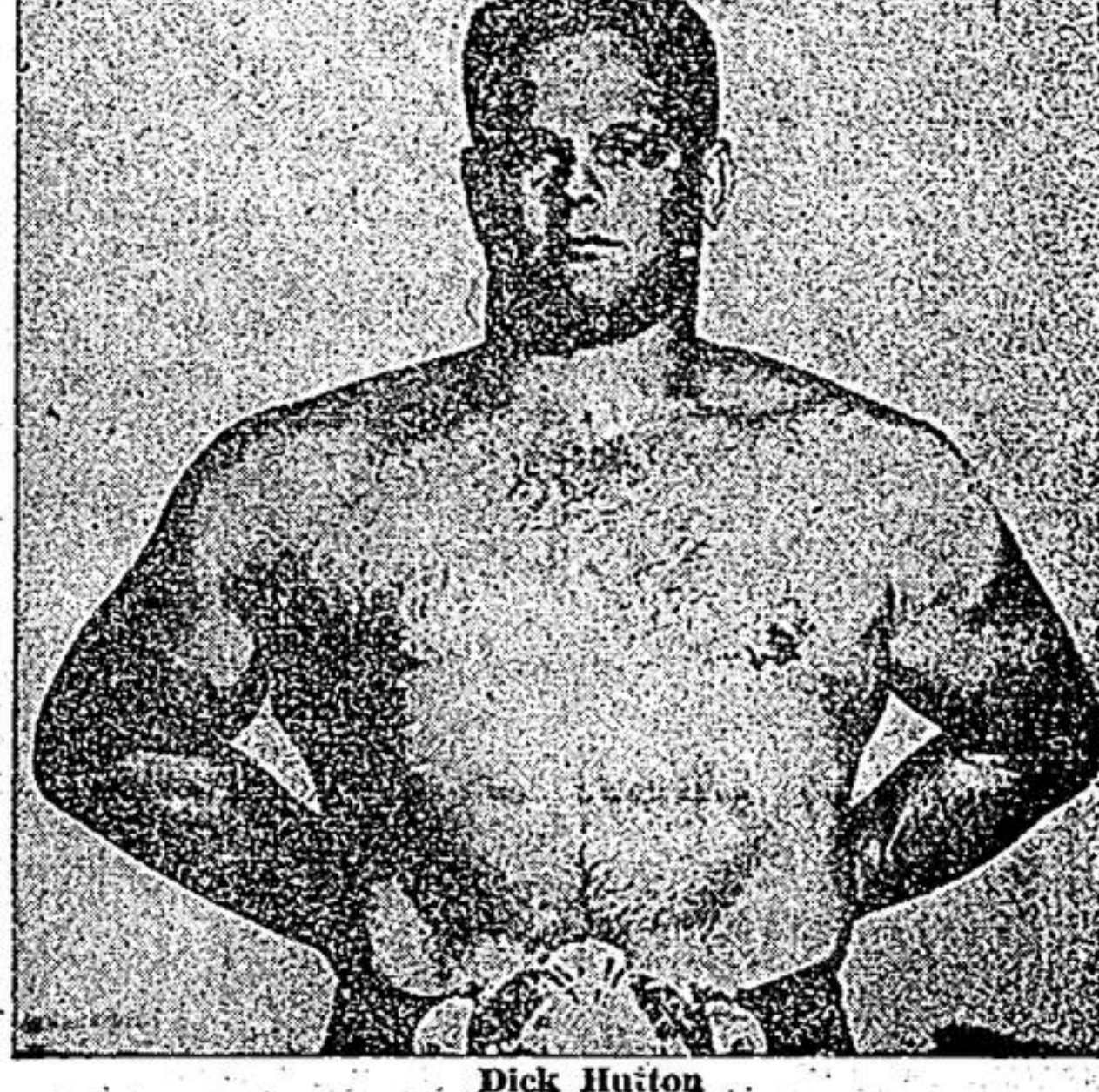
