

A friend of mine said 'If you can make jelly from one kind of fruit, then jelly made from two kinds of truit will be twice as good!" Well, that's certainly true of the following recipe:

CURRANY AND MASPBERRY JELLY

41/2 cups juice (about 1 quart fully ripe red currents and 11/5 quarts ripe red raspberries) 7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar 15 bottle Certo fruit pectin

First, prepare the juice. Crush 1 quart fully ripe red currants. Add 34 cup water and bring to a boil. Crush about 11/2 quarts fully ripe red raspberries. Place fruits in jelly bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 41/2 cups into very large
