Eric-Hutton Disqualified In Feature Wrestling Match

On Saturday night, July 11, in the Stouffville Arena, wrestling Stars from Maple Leaf Gardens battled it out in three matches.

The first match found Al Korman, a 238 pounder from Toronto, matched against Mike Valintino, a 250 pounder from Malta. The match was won by Valintino with a block of the ropes and a press. The time of the final count was 19:24.

The second bout found Karl Kulaski, weighing 240 lbs., from East Berlin, Germany, matched against Pat Flanagan, a Torontonian weighing 238 pounds. In eighteen minutes fourteen seconds, Kulaski was disqualified for striking the referee.

The feature bout of the night found Yukon Eric, 265 pound giant of the Yukon, battling it out with Dick Hutton, a 250 pounder from Tulsa, Oklahoma. The match was a 3-fall 1-hour time limit affair.

The first fall went to Dick Hutton at 14:02 when he seized Eric in a submission hold. Conversely, the second fall went to Yukon Eric at 5:14 with one of his famous bearhugs. Much of the third round was staged outside the ring apron.

Hutton tossed Eric through the ropes to the arena floor and on an attempt by Eric to return to the ring, he was again knocked away by Hutton. This time, however, Eric grabbed Hutton and pulled him from the ring. The battle raged among the spectators for a number of minutes, although the ten second count had been given by referee Joe Gallow to end the match. Both men were disqualified.

Moose on Increase

Ontario's moose population last winter probably numbered about 125,000, the department of lands and forests says.

The figure is the result of a moose inventory described as the most ambitious yet taken by the department's fish and wildlife division.

The moose population in 1953 was put at 42,000 and department officials say moose have been building up in most parts of Ontario for the last 10 years.

Lands Minister Spooner of Ontario, describing the inventory in a report, said: "Four moose management regions were established, each containing a characteristic forest type. The area covered by an aerial inventory included only part of the moose range used by licensed hunters. The area to the north extending to Hudson Bay was omitted."

Twenty-five-mile-square plots were assigned to aircraft crews taking place in the inventory. A total of 276 plots were searched from the air. Flying time came to more than 334 hours. A total of 2733 moose were seen on the plots with an additional 29 counted during repeat surveys or extra plots.

The estimate of moose in each management region was based on animals actually seen. Using track evidence, aircraft crews estimated the probable numbers of moose on each plot. The figure settled on was 107,000 for the four areas and 16,750 in other districts where figures were based largely on trapper's reports.
