**Judge Cuts Award To Widow 50 p.c.** A 32-year-old Unionville district widow was last week awarded \$5,982 in Ontario Supreme Court hearings in Kitchener. However, she will receive only half that amount because a jury decided her husband shared equal liability for the accident in which he was killed. Clifford C. Hammer, 38, died of injuries received when the car he was driving was in a head-on collision April 5, 1958, with one driven by Karl F. Gollinger, 22, of 14 Church St., on Highway 7, near Petersburg. Mr. Gollinger will receive \$1,639 as a counter-claim, and Arnold Boyd, Mr. Hammer's brother-in-law who was a passenger in the Hammer vehicle, will receive \$355. Mr. Gollinger and Mrs. Boyd were injured in the mishap. A six-man jury decided that Mr. Hammer and Mr. Gollinger were equally negligent in failing to allow each other's vehicles one-half the road. It was because of the jury's decision that a 50 percent reduction was made by Mr. Justice A. G. Gale in awards made by the jury to the plaintiffs, Mrs. Bertha Hammer and Mr. Boyd, and to the defendant, Mr. Gollinger.
