We are pleased to report that Ross Pattenden has entered Queen's University for the Engineering Course. Good luck, Ross.

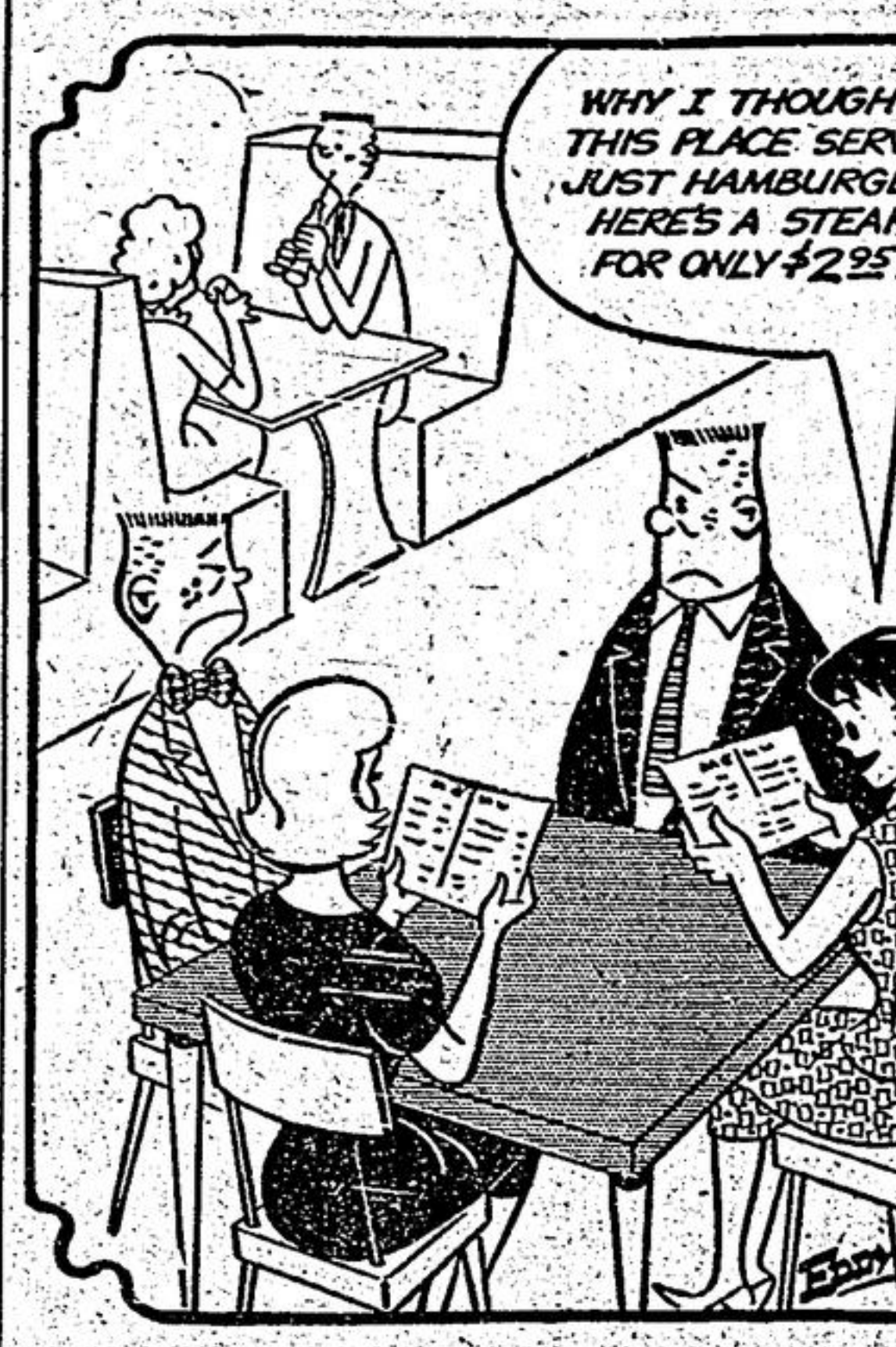
BLOOMINGTON

Bond Issue on Sale October 13

The federal government's 1959 series of Canada Savings Bonds will go on sale Oct. 13, bearing a record average interest yield of 4.98 a year for the nine-year maturities.
Finance Minister Fleming announced the details of the new series 14, which will be dated Nov. 1, 1959, and mature Nov. 1, 1968 at the rate of 103 percent of par value.
The bonds will be in nine coupons, one a year, the first paying four percent interest, the second 4 1/2 percent, the third 4 1/2 percent and the remaining six, 5 percent.
This works out to an average interest of 4.98 percent, to maturity, compared with an average of 4.19 percent on the 1958 series and the previous record yield 4.46 in 1957.
