Young Mother Passes In Thirty-fifth Year

Many residents of Stouffville were shocked to learn last week-end of the sudden death of Mrs. Raymond Warburton in Toronto East General Hospital. Mrs. Warburton was the former Grace Kathleen Burkholder, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Burkholder, Market Street, Stouffville. She passed away on Thursday evening, Sept. 24th after a very brief illness. She was in her 35th year.

The deceased had spent her early years in Stouffville, and attended both public and high school here. She was identified with the Baptist Church and was active in the work of the young people's Bible Class.

Besides her husband, the young mother leaves three daughters, Irene, Barbara and Sharon, also one sister Phyllis (Mrs. W. Hall), and three brothers, Grant of Orillia, Douglas, Cedar Valley and Kenneth, Bloomington.

The funeral was conducted privately from the Trull Funeral Home, Danforth Avenue, by Rev. Mr. Armstrong of Kenbourne United Church. Interment was made at Resthaven Memorial Gardens.

Mr. Steve Thompson enjoyed a two week vacation recently and spent his holidays with his brother near Chatsworth in Grey County and with friends in Bruce County.

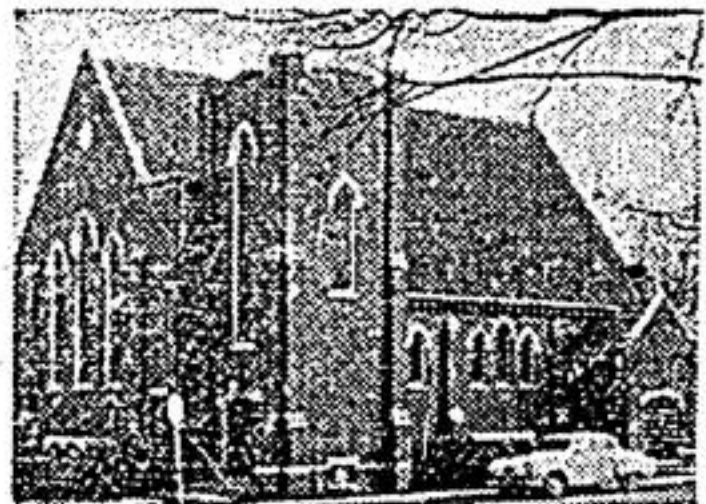

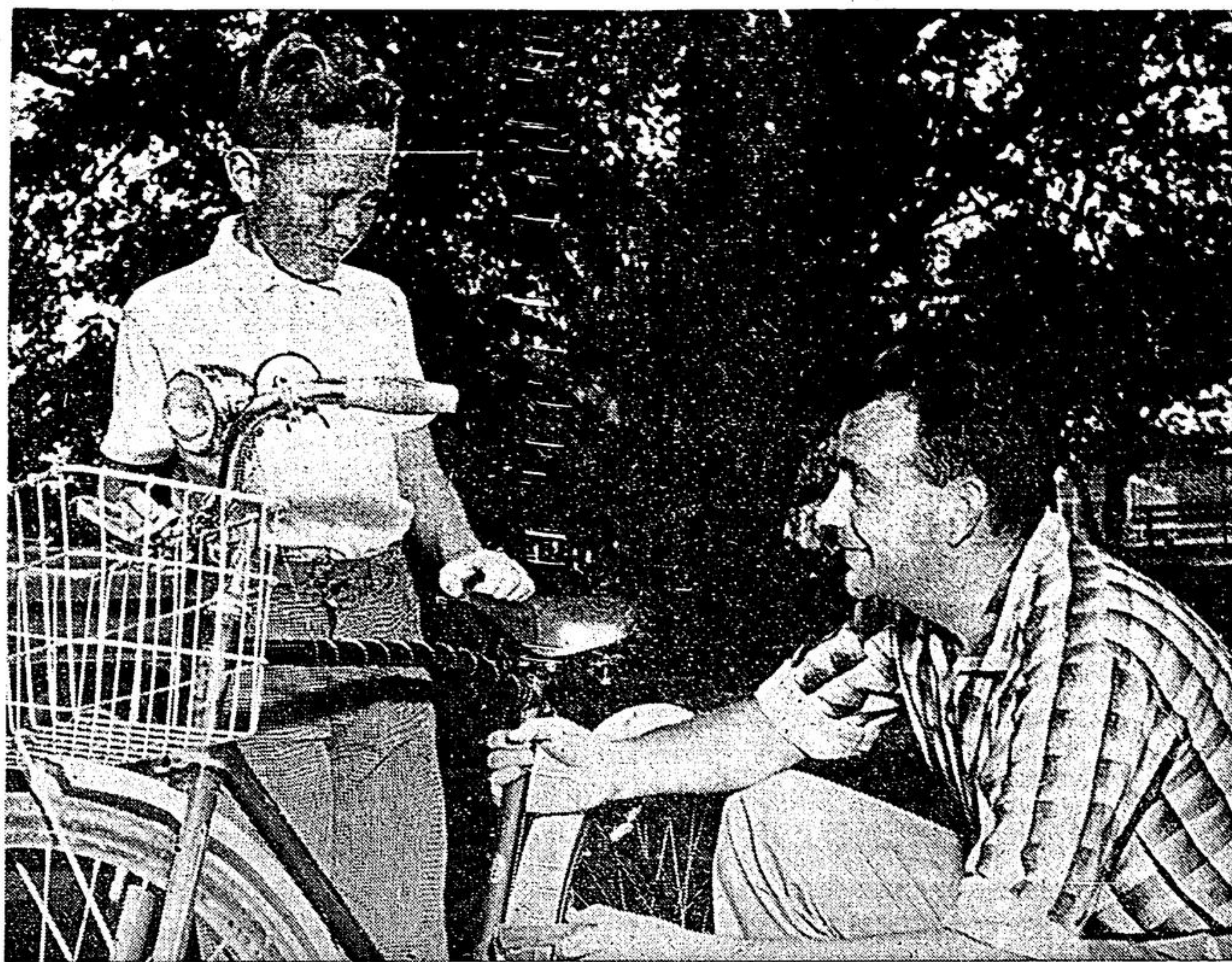

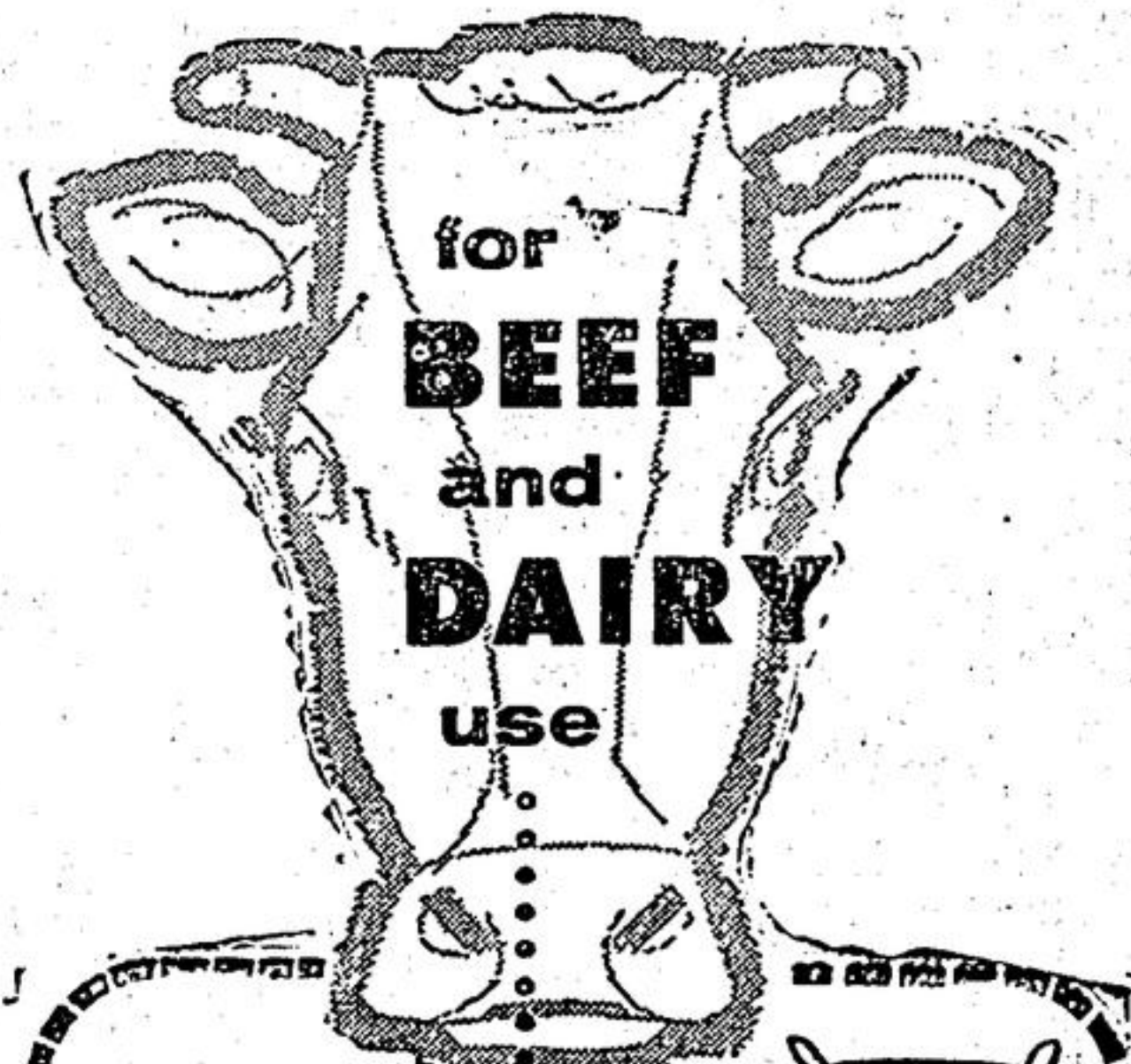
The Stouffville Tribune has new portable typewriters to rent, also Smith-Corona and Underwood new machines for sale.
