Improvements in Farm Loan Act This Week

The new Farm Credit Act passed at the last session of Parliament, will go into effect this week, raising the amount available for farm purchase or improvement to loans of \$20,000 rather than \$15,000.

The implementation of the new credit system, announced Thursday by Agriculture Minister Harkness, includes a flat interest rate of five percent. The act succeeds the Canadian Farm Loan Act.

Assets and responsibilities of the Canadian Farm Loan Board will be assumed by the five-man farm credit corporation.

Four of the five members were named today. They are: T. J. Rutherford, chairman, vacating his present position as a director of the Soldier Settlement and Veterans' Land Act; Deputy-Minister Lucien Lalonde

of the veterans affairs department; A. S. Abell, director of the federal-provincial relations section of the finance department; and A. H. Turner, vice-chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization Board.

There was no indication of when the fifth member would be appointed. Assisting the corporation will be an advisory committee appointed by the agriculture minister. The whole system, it was explained by the government earlier, is designed to make provision for loans more flexible.

For example, a farm loan now can be based on 75 percent of the appraised value of a farm, rather than on the previous 65 percent. And for the younger farmer there is a supervised loan applicable to farmers aged 21 to 45 years to help them become established.
