

Improvements in Farm Loan Act This Week

The new Farm Credit Act of the veterans affairs depart-Parliament, will go into effect the federal-provincial relations this week, raising the amount section of the finance departavailable for farm purchase or ment; and A. H. Turner, viceimprovement to loans of \$20,000 | chairman of the Agricultural rather than \$15,000.

The implementation of the new credit system, announced Thursday by Agriculture Min-ister Harkness, includes a flat interest rate of five percent. The act succeeds the Canadian Farm Loan Act.

Assets and responsibilities of the Canadian Farm Loan Board will be assumed by the five-man farm credit corporation.
