## Motorists Get Break Markham Figures Show

In speaking on the decrease in fines in the Markham Twp. police department, Reeve Clarke stated that the method now in force of stopping and serving a motorist on the spot, had slowed down detection and allowed more motorists to get away with a law infraction without being caught.

During 1958, Markham Township police collected \$6,925.75 in fines, and the budget for this year was drawn up on the basis of \$7,000. However, to date, only \$2,890.39 has been collected.

To council's satisfaction, relief figures are down considerably, being only \$2,411.07 as compared with \$7,561.16 in 1958.

The figures for various departments, as to the amount spent to date, the total amount for 1958 and the amount budgeted for, were presented to Markham council on Monday night.

**\$900 for Fires**

Deputy-reeve Dean took exception to an account of \$900 for attending Markham Twp. fires, from Richmond Hill. He drew attention to the fact that the particulars given for a number of the fires showed that they had been set by children playing with matches. He recommended that some method of control should be instituted, and some method of control exercised by the police.

The matter was referred to the Fire Committee for a report.

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## Protest Assessment

A deputation of four residents from Wilcox Lake, appeared before Whitchurch Township council on Thursday evening to protest the increased assessment of property in their area. Mr. Kurt Krechel acted as the spokesman.

Reeve Richardson told the deputation that the assessor was now operating on a 100% basis of assessment rather than 70% as formerly. He said that all things being equal, the change should not bring any increased taxes.

Mr. Krechel said that complaints in the Wilcox Lake area were numerous and he asked if council was taking any action to combat the increase or reduce the heavy tax.

Clerk Jack Crawford replied that the arrears of taxes to the end of 1958 and taking the total of August 1st, was from \$25 to \$27,000. Tax arrears sales, he said, had not been held during the last few years, but the taxes were held against the properties.

All four members of the deputation said they intended to file appeals against the assessment.

**Grants Approved**

Council agreed to the payment of the following charity grants: Institute for the Blind \$25, Salvation Army \$25, Aurora Lions Club \$10 and Oak Ridges Lions Club \$50.

**Water Study**

The firm of H. A. Babcock advised council that the Ontario Water Resources board would supply a study of any area, for water conditions without charge and council agreed to go along with their suggestion.
