### "Aces" Leave Home For Group Finals

In an unprecedented move in the annals of Markham softball, the Intermediate "Aces" have vacated their home park for the remaining games of the group playoff finals. As we go to press, they currently hold a one game lead over the highly-rated Scugog Cleaners of Oshawa.

The main complaint of the Markham players is the condition of the home diamond. They have refused to play any final games there while the grounds remain in their present state. Fan support has also dropped, partially due to the frigid temperatures.

In the series opener, Markham rallied from a 2-0 deficit to post a 5-2 victory. They scored five runs in the eighth inning. Costly errors, three solid hits and a wild pitch put the victory in the bag for the "Aces".

Pitcher Bruce Middleton got the rally rolling in the eighth. He reached first on an infield error. Terry Lunau dropped a perfect bunt at the plate and beat it out. Jim Raymer was safe on an error and Morley Petch smashed a triple into the deep outfield. Jack Watson singled, Jack Cross was safe on an error and Mike Huggins drove a fly ball that scored Watson after the catch. Oshawa left runners stranded in the bottom of the eighth and in the ninth when hurler Middleton bore down to retire the side each time.

In spite of a two week layoff, the "Aces" played fine ball. The series is a best three out of five games. They played again on Wednesday night.

# Hagersville Grabs Jr. Title From Defending Champs

Cards "Die at Plate" in Rubber Match. Lose 5-0

It was Hagersville's turn to ride the red fire engine through the town's Main Street on Saturday afternoon. It was Stouffville's turn to offer the congratulatory handshakes. As righthander, Glenn VanEvery blazed three strikes past pinch-hitter, John Roxborough in the ninth inning, the coveted crown rode with the pitch. It was Hagersville's game, their series and their championship. The "Cards", a number of which had taken a rough ride from partisan Hagersville fans throughout the contest, were quick to commend the victors for their successful shot at the title. They were the game's undisputed winners. They blinked the locals by a score of 5-0.

### Too Good or Too Bad

It was difficult to tell whether VanEvery's sinking curve ball was too good or whether the Stouffville batters were just too bad. A total of 14 "Card" batsmen went down, either swinging crazily or with the bat parked on their shoulders. He retired the side in order in four of the nine innings. Stouffville had a couple of minor threats working in the third, seventh and ninth innings, but the players died on the sacks. Second-sacker, Lynn Taylor brandished the only big bat in the locals' lineup but he was left stranded every time. He belted a double in the fourth, a single in the ninth and was safe on an error in the seventh. He failed to advance past second base. John Little looped a short Texas League single into short centrefield in the ninth. Second-sacker, Bill Prince dropped to his knees in attempting to grab the ball and Little was safe on the play. That was the extent of Stouffville's plate power.

### Do Nothing Wrong

Hagersville could do nothing wrong. They clipped hurler Harry Barber for seven safeties. They streaked around the bases like fleet-footed deer. They gobbled up the few drives that did venture into the outfield. They committed only one error. In addition, their pitcher was "red hot". From the first pitch to the last, it just wasn't Stouffville's day. Hagersville threatened to explode for runs in the opening inning but the side was retired with the bases loaded. They had men on base in the second, third and fourth but couldn't squeeze them around. In the fifth inning, it happened. Charlie Hill led off with a single. Winger bounced a line drive off Taylor's leg and all hands were safe. Pitcher, VanEvery was a sacrifice out but Bill Prince singled to score Hill. Another hit by Smith brought Winger and Prince across the plate. As far as Stouffville's hopes were concerned, the game could have ended then and there. Hagersville added two insurance tallies in the seventh. Two walks, two errors and a wild pitch ran the homers' total to five. They were retired in order in the eighth.

### Too Much "Stuff"

Aside from Stouffville's Lynn Taylor, the "Cards" could not cope with the offerings of Hagersville's VanEvery. Gord Eckardt, the locals' long-ball slugger, was a strike-out victim on three occasions. He fled deep to left field in the sixth. Bob Stover, Ted Suzuki and John Little each went down on strikes twice. Coach Don Haynes' tossed two pinch-hitters into the fray in the late innings, but they, too, met a similar fate. Roger Stover and John Roxborough went down swinging. Lynn Taylor had the combination to VanEvery's curve ball. Both base hits were solid drives. His two-bagger might have been a triple but it became bogged down in the long outfield grass. Glenn Jackson also hit the ball every time up but was thrown out at first base.

### Listless Contest

The nine inning contest was not an exciting game to watch. The crowd, although outnumbering Stouffville fans 10-1, appeared only slightly overjoyed at their club's good fortune. The players, too, lacked the enthusiasm that should have prevailed at a Provincial finals game. At times, the infield was so quiet, one could have heard the proverbial pin drop. The contest lacked the colour and excitement that was noticeable in both games at Stouffville. It was possible that the 3-0 cushion built up by Hagersville in the fifth inning plus the pitching prowess of VanEvery established a mental picture of a would-be championship, club long before the final out was made. A large number of home town rooters left the stands early in the afternoon to attend a softball double-header at Jarvis.

### Big Holes To Fill

In spite of the loss, coach Don Haynes of the Cards offered no excuses. He noted, however, that the local squad "missed the boat" when Hagersville battled from behind to score a 3-3 draw in the second game of the series. The Cards took the opener 5-4. They dropped the third contest 5-1. It is rather ridiculous to think that any team could lose the services of two ace performers, Haynes and Madill, without feeling the "pinch". Coach Haynes praised the work of his newcomers, Roger Stover, Keith Scott, Roger Todd, John Roxborough and other first-year additions. He noted that they played a big part in Stouffville's sweep of the series with Creemore. It is possible that the Cards may move up from Junior ranks to Intermediate competition next year. A number of the players are still eligible for junior ball if the management decides to reclaim the title. One can hardly be critical of any club that wins a Provincial championship one year and is a competitor in the finals in the following season. The Cards have established a fine record and have gained a good following. Fans will be hoping for their return to the base paths again next summer.

## Pheasant Shoot in Townships Set for October 21st to 31st

Open season for pheasants will be October 21 to 31, inclusive, in King, Whitechurch, Vaughan, Markham and East Gwillimbury, the lands and forests Office at Maple has announced.

The department has released some 15,300 birds in the various townships of the Lake Simcoe district (counties of York, Ontario, Dufferin, Simcoe & Peel). Some 2,000 were leg-banded with a metal band bearing the letters "L.S." and a number, and were released in Whitechurch, Pickering, and in the Barrie and Stayner areas.

Largest concentration of banded birds is in Whitechurch township, and hunters taking one of these birds are requested to report the band number and locality where the bird was shot, to the local conservation officer or to the Maple office.

Dear Sir,

I would like to take this opportunity to clarify some misunderstandings in the realm of Pickering Township regarding the control of firearms.

The original By-law No. 2264 restricted the use of firearms to 300 ft. north of the Second Concession excluding certain areas mentioned therein.

By request of Ratepayers living beyond the bounds covered by the said By-law, I presented to Council a resolution to extend the said By-law to the Third Concession, which was passed unanimously by all members of Council.

At the next Council meeting, delegations were present and requested it to be extended to the Fourth Concession; others asked for it to be extended to Hwy. No. 7; one taxpayer's request was to cover the whole Township. A large delegation opposed any change in the By-law.

As a result of the numerous requests of the delegations, pro and con, I made a resolution to turn it over to the By-law Committee for study and recommendation. They, in turn, met with the Game Committee and brought back to Council a recommendation that the original By-law remain in force, but to include the following areas:

Martins Subdivision, Squires Beach, Pickering Beach, Riverdale Subdivision, Ontario Beach, North Harwood Subdivision

As your representative on Council, I have acted in good faith in presenting to Council the requests of Ratepayers of this Township and in doing so, I trust I have merited the approval of all who are concerned.
