W. G. Gohn A Former York County Warden

A farmer and former warden of the County of York, Wesley C. Gohn, 82, died on Sunday at Bradford. He had been bed-ridden since 1952 when he had a stroke.

Born on Crown-deeded land in Markham Township, he farmed in that area near Dollar, continuously until 1937, when he retired.

During his younger days Mr. Gohn was on the Markham council. He became warden of York County in 1931. He was a former secretary of the Mothers' Allowance Board for York County, and was active in all community affairs.

He leaves six children: Mrs. J. O. Smith of Islington; Elgin and Aubrey Gohn of Toronto; Lloyd Gohn of Waterloo; Irvin of Markham, and Mrs. W. Dedlow of Stouffville. He leaves also 14 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

The funeral service will be at 2 p.m., Tuesday, at the Dixon funeral home at Markham, with burial in Buttonville Lutheran cemetery.

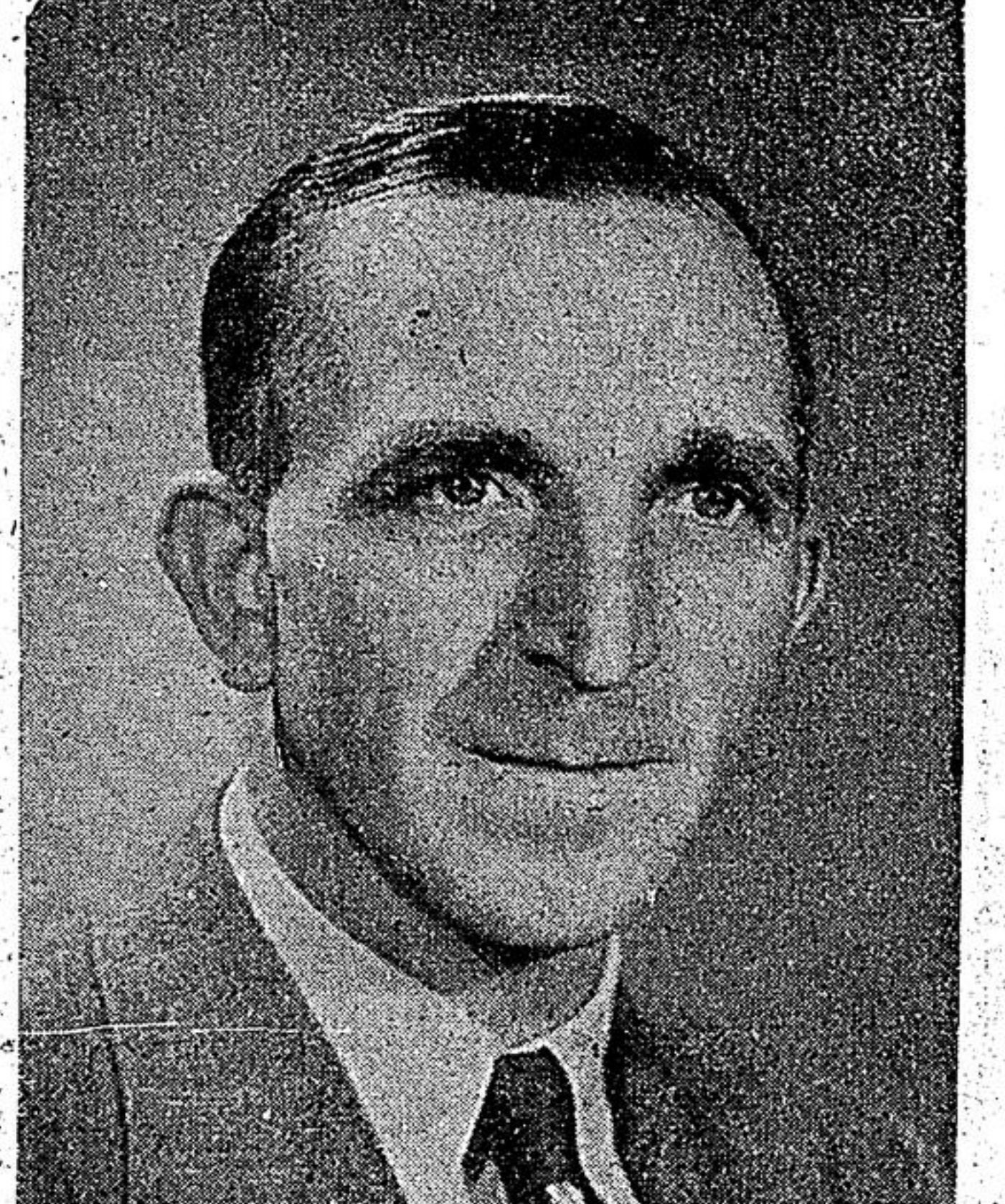
