

Contest For Deputy-Reeveship

(Continued from page 12) on conc. 8 and on the Uxbridge-Pickering township. He said he hoped this work could be extended next year. He also hoped that some work could be done overlooked for a long time," he agreed.

Prefers an Election
Both Ward 1 councillor, Harvey Spang and Ward 2 councillor, Edgar James thanked the ratepayers for returning them by acclamation but both stated they would have preferred an election. Councillor James has held the Ward 2 post for the past three years. He praised the Reeve for his efforts in arranging the agreement with the Crusader Development Company at Frenchman's Bay. "He has come up with a hard bargain" he said. Mr. James noted that the population in the township had doubled within the past 10 years. He pointed out, however, that as the population increased, so the cost of services and administration had also increased. He voiced regret that more road work had not been done in Ward 2 during the past term.

On 9 Committees
Ward 3 councillor, Harry Ashton told his audience that during the past year he had served on seven separate committees and had been the chairman of two others. He noted that the township Welfare Dept. had been re-organized and was operating smoothly. He contended that the ratepayers in his ward had received more road construction and maintenance for

their tax dollars than in any previous term. "Every section of ward 3 has had work done on it," he said.

Explosive Expansion
"Pickering Twp. business is big business," stated Ward 4 councillor Ross Hawthorne. Mr. Hawthorne will contest the Deputy-Reeveship against the present incumbent, Mrs. Jean McPherson. "Everything points to explosive expansion," he suggested. He contended that the future of the Township hinged on sound business planning. "This year will probably be the most important year to date," he continued. He pointed out that only by acquiring industry would the township grow in proper balance.

Need Technical School
Councillor, Miss Violet Swan, seeking re-election in ward 5, pointed out that the township was in need of a technical school where various trades could be taught. "The sooner we get it, the better," she said. She also urged the formation of a Board of Education. Touching on fire protection in the township, she said she had kept in close contact with each fire department and its members. She noted that a new fire hall had been built in Claremont. She praised the work of the Historical Society. "Its formation is one of the best things that could have happened in the township," she said. Mr. Carl P. Meyers, Zephyr, was the winner of the Ontario County 500 Bushel Potato Club this year. He used foundation Sebago seed potatoes. His estimated yield in bushels per acre was 689.

He was also high on the score for quality. The presentations this year were made on a score combining both yield and quality.

Mr. Ross Harrison, Mount Albert, was in second place with a yield of 664 bushels. He used the Huron variety. Mr. Horner Walker, Zephyr, was in third position, he also used the Huron variety. There were 20 potato growers who took part in this high yield competition this year. The average yield for the 20 growers was 508.6 bushels.

The 500 Bushel Potato Club competition was brought to a conclusion with a Banquet in Zephyr Community Hall on Friday, November 27th. Mr. Bob Meek, Sandford, Chairman of the 500 Bushel Potato Club, chaired the Banquet.

Mr. R. E. Goodin, Field Crops Branch, addressed the meeting. He gave a review of the potato situation at the present time. Mr. Clifford Ross, President of the Ontario County Soil and Crop Improvement Association and Mr. Owen Sweetman, Little Britain, congratulated the 500 Bushel Potato Club on their success this year. Mr. Ross presented to the 12 potato growers who exceeded the 500 Bushel objective this year. Mr. H. L. Fair, Agricultural Representative, announced the prize winners and asked the various donors of cash and merchandise to present their prizes. Mr. Bob Timbers, Mount Albert, presented a very splendid set of color slides covering his two trips to Great Britain as a contestant in the World Plowing Match.

Mr. Ches. Oldham, Zephyr, expressed the appreciation of the potato growers to the ladies for their splendid banquet and to the donors of cash and merchandise for their co-operation in supporting the 500 Bushel Potato Club each year.
