Cedar Grove News

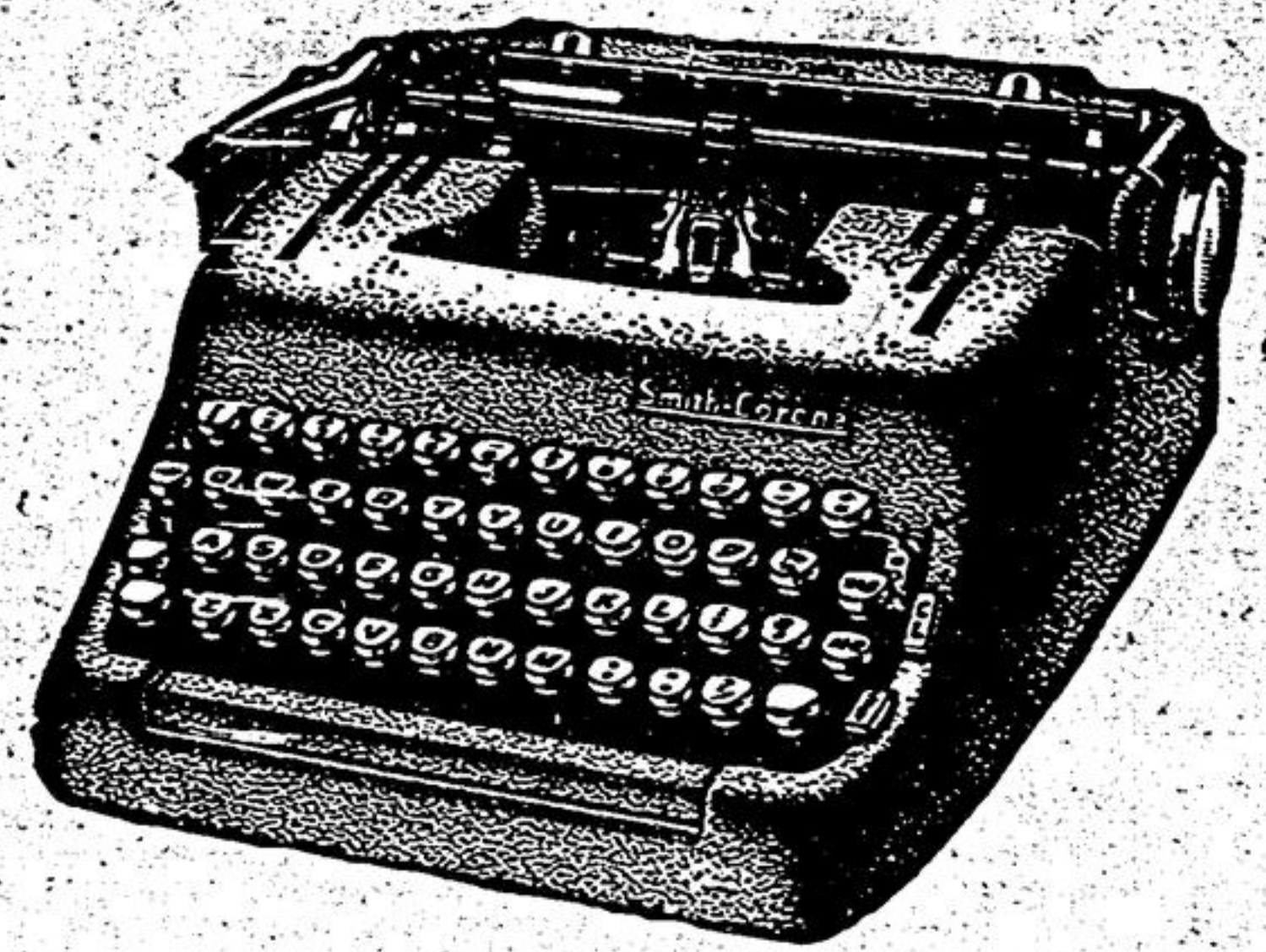

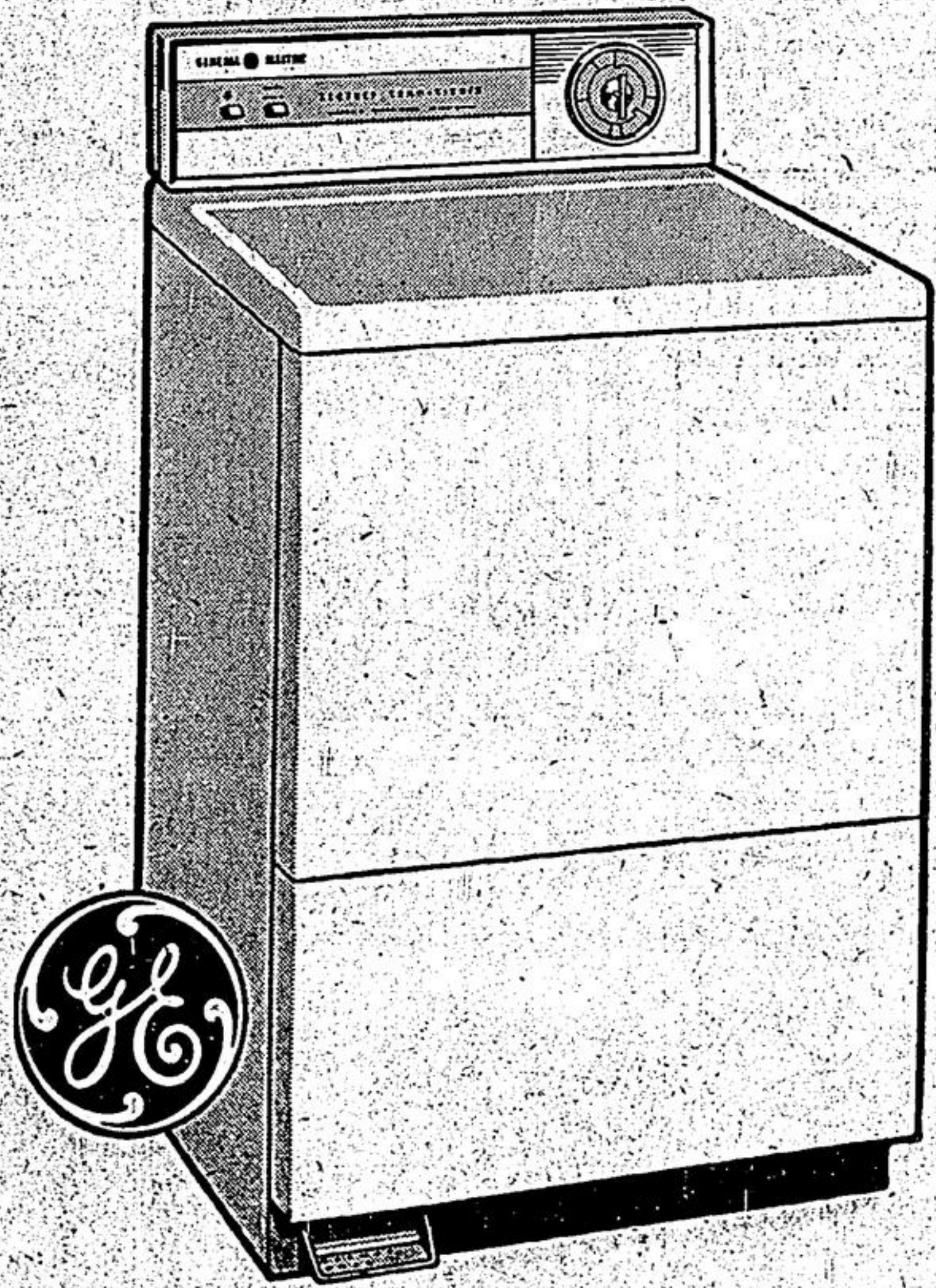
