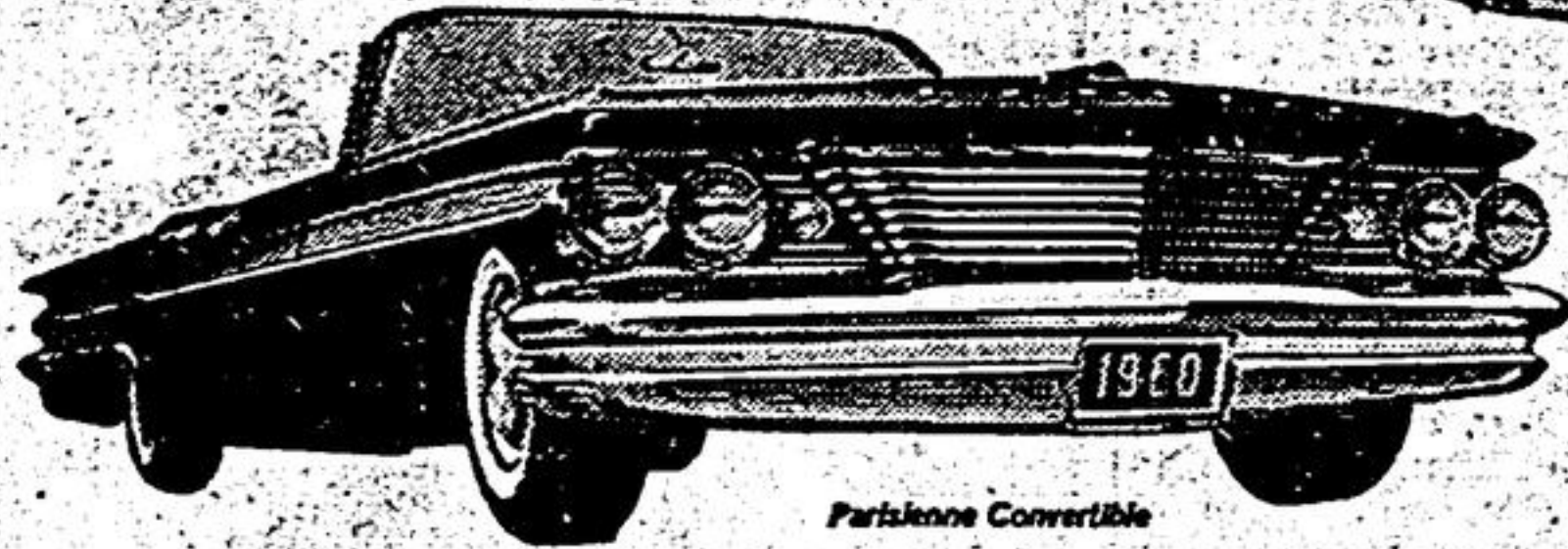

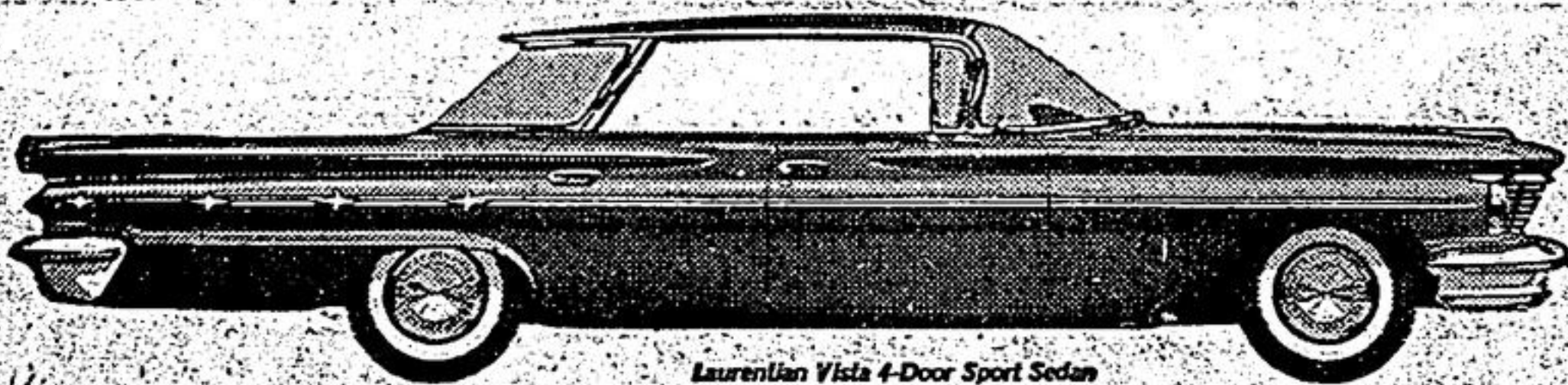

United Co-op Buys Big Turkey Business

One of the largest broiler and turkey processing businesses in Ontario will be purchased by United Co-operatives of Ontario. It was announced to delegates at UCO's 12th annual meeting in Toronto. The Tend-R-Flesh business, which has an annual sales volume of about four million dollars, will likely be taken over by the 1st of February, 1960.

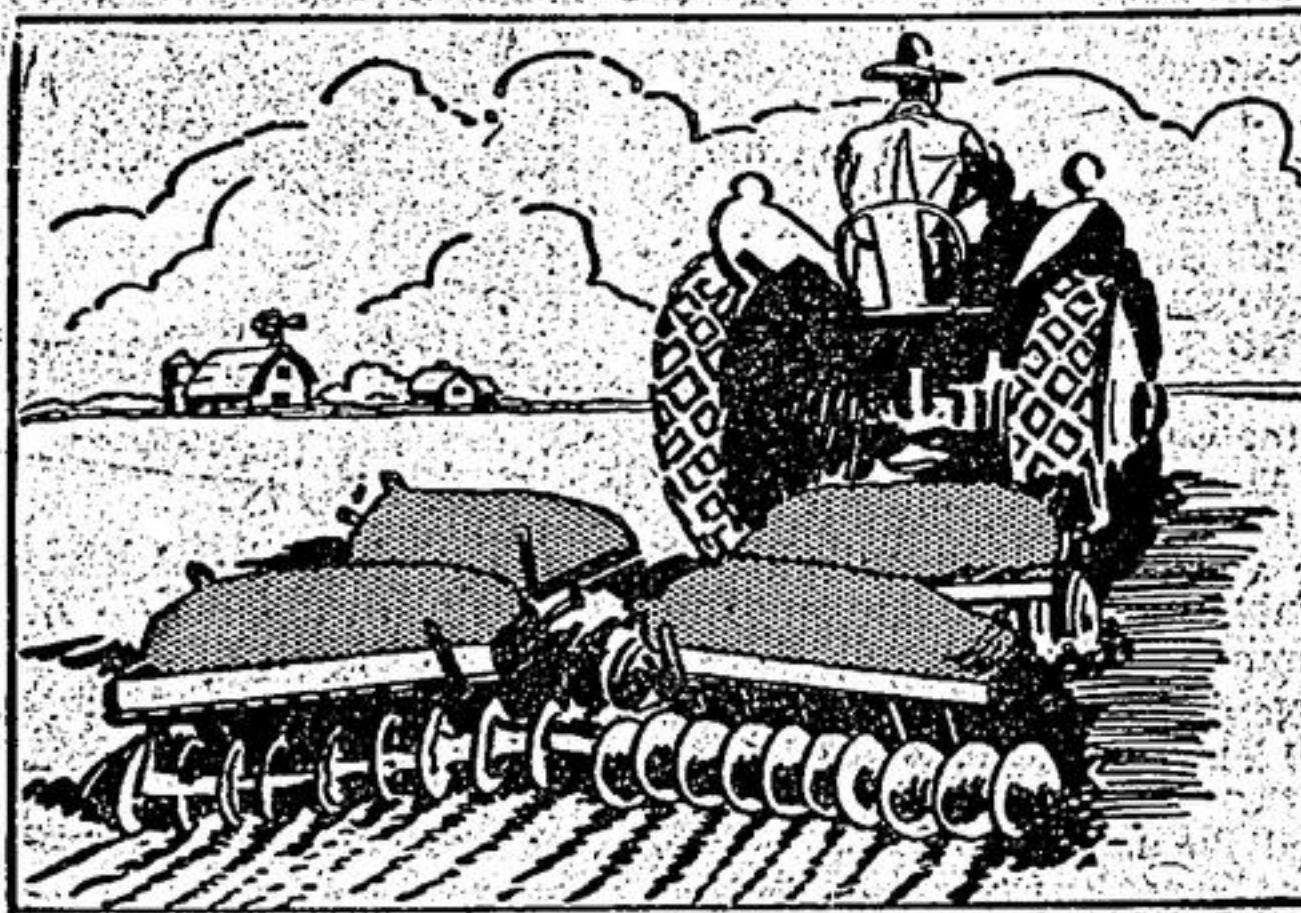
Leonard Harman, assistant general manager, and the man recently named to succeed Hugh Bailey as general manager of

UCO in January, made the announcement to delegates from across Ontario. "This business will be operated as a subsidiary corporation featuring the Tend-R-Flesh name," he said. "Growers of broilers and turkeys will be invited to participate in patronage returns, in financing, and on influencing policy through a representative committee of producers. Present management will continue with the business," Mr. Harman reported.

It is expected that local co-operatives, and the UCO feed

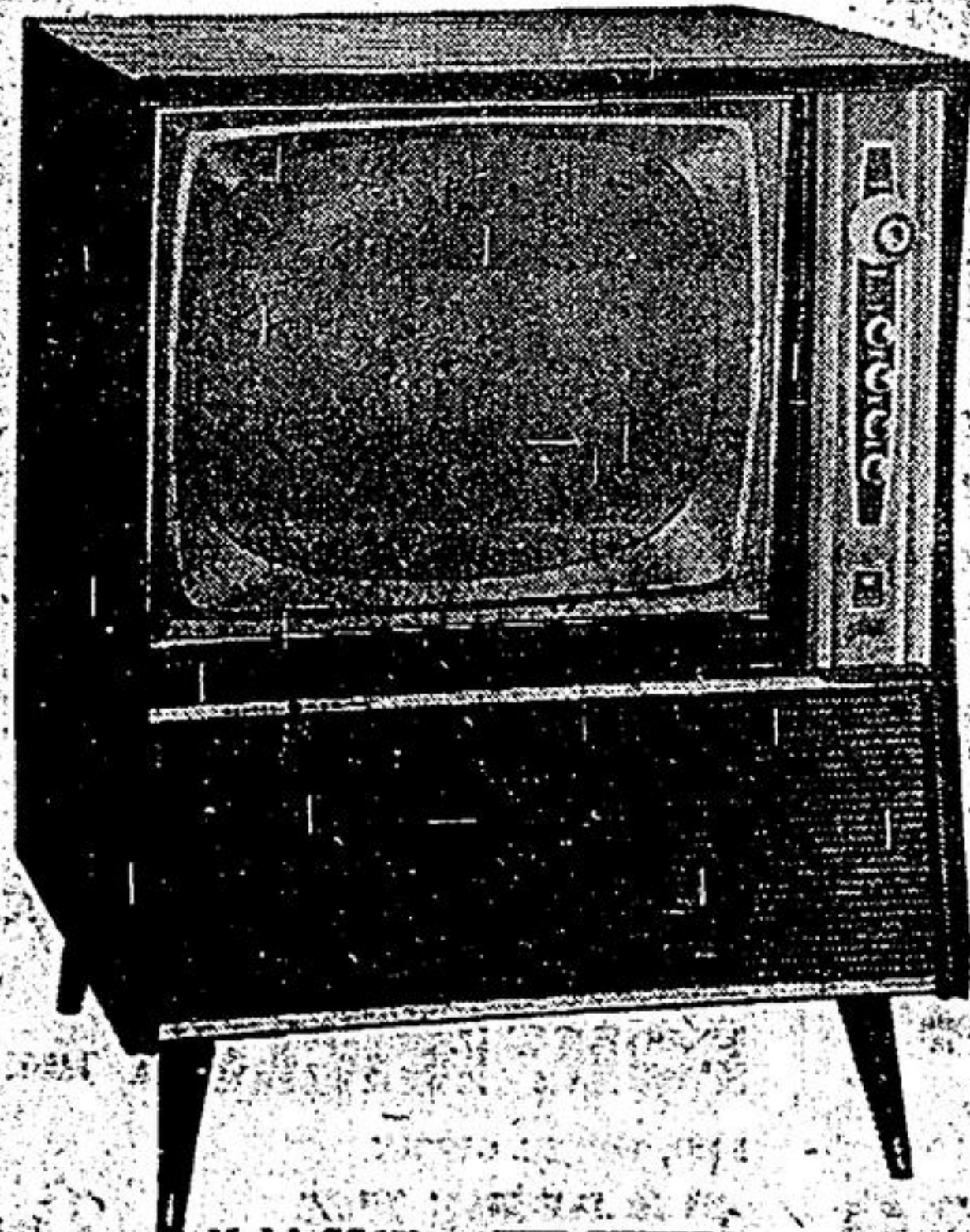
plant in Guelph will expand their broiler and turkey feed programs. "After careful analysis of trends in agriculture," Mr. Harman told the 500 delegates. "UCO directors and management felt the purchase of a broiler processing business was necessary to allow the co-operative feed program to continue to play its expanding role in Ontario. We regard the purchase of the Tend-R-Flesh business as a major move into conducting an increasing proportion of the farmers' off-farm business in Ontario, under farmer ownership," he concluded.

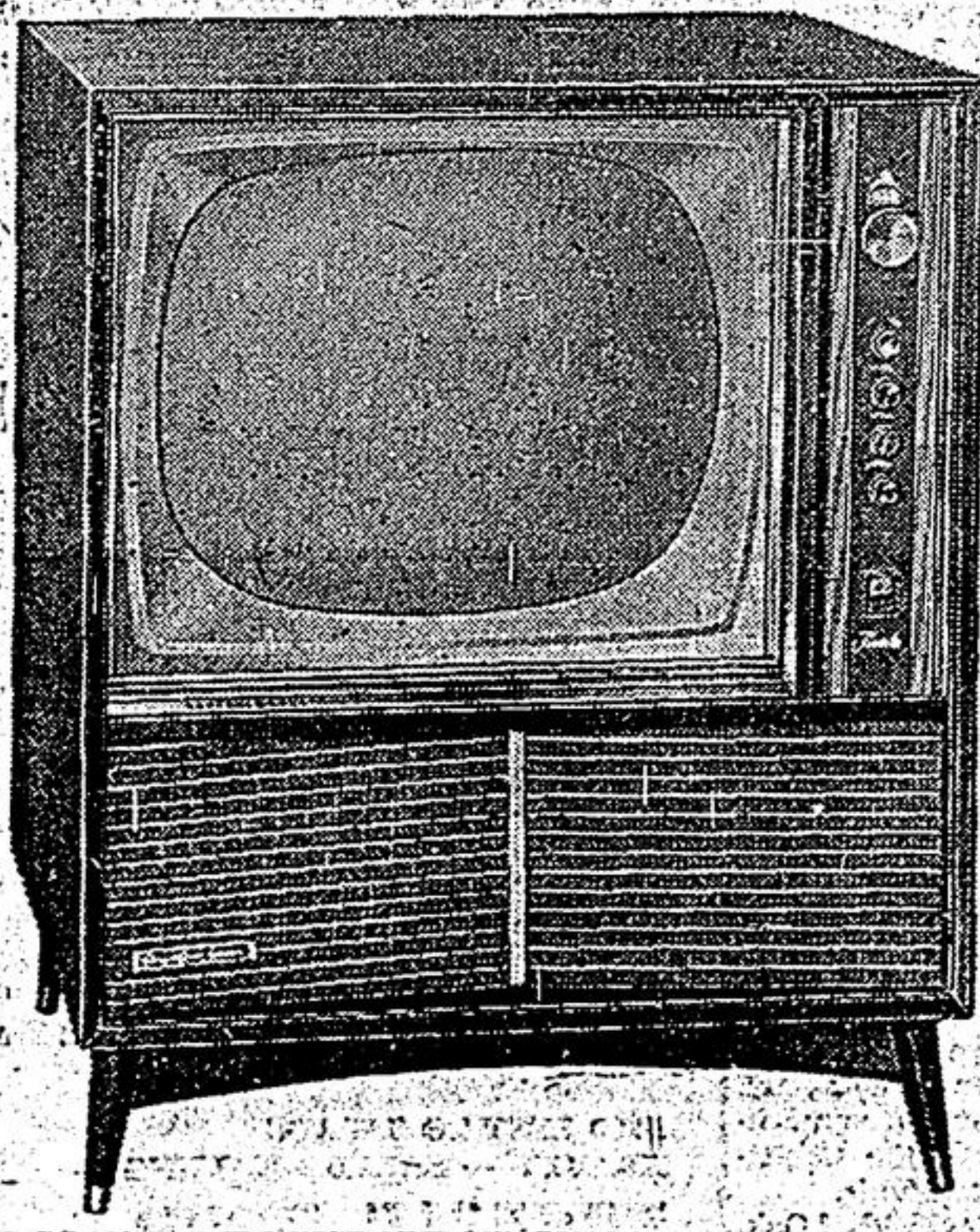
