WHEN DID THE FIRST **CANADIAN COINS APPEAR?** The first Canadian coins, silver 5-sol and 15-sol pieces, were struck in 1670 by Louis XIV of France for his colonies in North America. The 15-sol piece has become one of the rarest of all Canadian coins and today is worth about \$600. The first official Canadian coins to be produced in Canada appeared in 1908, the year the mint was established in Ottawa. Before that, all Canadian coins since the conquest had been struck at either the Royal Mint at London or the Heaton Mint in Birmingham,
