WHEN WAS CANADA'S FIRST CENSUS?

Almost three hundred years ago - in 1666. In that year the great Intendant Talon directed the taking of a census that probably antedates any other national census in the world, in the modern sense of the term. Halon himself acted as one of the enumerators. The 1666 census ascertained the number of inhabitants in New France, their sex, age, marital condition and occupations. The count was 3215 persons. A complete census of the Dominion is taken every ten decennial ones.
