The Claremont Community Softball League showed an operating profit of \$630.69, according to an itemized statement prepared by the Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. Cliff Dunkeld. In spite of only fair crowds during the regular schedule and exceedingly poor weather conditions in the playoff finals, the report showed the highest profits in a number of years. Claremont, the group champions, collected the biggest share of the receipts, \$118.97. Greenwood, Markham, and Peach's topped the one hundred dollar mark. Altona and Ringwood failed to make the playoffs. They each received \$88.53.

The league's biggest expenditure was for hydro. It totalled \$177.66. Umpires' fees amounted to \$170.00.

Claremont Topples "Merchants" 5-3 In Rugged Game, Extend Comm. Lg. Lead

The two giants of the Community Hockey League, Claremont and Stouffville, "Merchants" (formerly Altona) clashed head-on in the feature contest, Tuesday night and few spectators left the arena until the final whistle had sounded. Both clubs engaged in a torrid battle. Claremont came out on the top end of a 5-3 score. It marked the final meeting between the two teams, prior to the playoffs.

Centre star, Bob Cherry was the focal point of the game. He proved his worth every time out. It was his speed and stickhandling ability that made the main difference between the clubs. He figured in four of his team's five goals, notching one and assisting on three others. Jim Cherry, Ron Hedges, Steve Wideman and Vern Ferguson also hit the target. Normie Neile, Alex Wilkins and Bill Allen were the Stouffville marksman. Claremont grabbed a 2-0 lead after only five minutes of play and never were headed. Stouffville staged a two-goal rally in the late stages of the final frame but could not pull the contest out of the fire.

At times during the rough and rugged tilt, it was strictly man vs. man. A total of thirty minutes in penalties was handed out. Rearguard Jim Cruikshank returned to the Claremont lineup. He spent nine minutes in the cooler. Stouffville's Alex Wilkins and Claremont's Jim Cherry were each pegged with a pair of trips to the sin bin. Stan Benson, Claremont defenceman used his 210 pound frame to good advantage and handed out some jolting checks. Stouffville's Alex Wilkins and Keith Borean were on the receiving end of bone-shaking jolts. Jim Cruikshank rocked Stouffville's Ron Graham. A near-fistic encounter broke out in the first period between Normie Neile of Stouffville and Jim Cherry of Claremont. They were separated before the skirmish resulted in a free-for-all.

Evans Good
Wes Evans turned in one of his best games in the Claremont cage. After a number of shaky performances earlier in the season, he is currently looking as good as any goal-guardian in the group. Stouffville's Geo. Martin, one of the best puck-stoppers in the league, played equally well. Evans made a brilliant glove catch in the first period on a scorching drive from Norm Neile. He also looked good on a drive by Bruce McDowell in the dying minutes of the game. Martin blocked Steve Wideman and Vern Ferguson in spectacular fashion. Claremont outshot Stouffville 18-16.

Important Win
The Claremont win could almost clinch first place for Lloyd Pascoe and company. With four games to go, two contests are against Ballantrae and Peach's, the fifth and sixth place clubs in the loop. They have one contest each with Greenwood and Ringwood. They currently hold a three point edge over second place Stouffville. SAW AND PAINT CAN SAVE ICED TREES

Trees bowed and broken by the ice storm can be saved by surgery, says a forestry expert. R. W. Hummel, of the Ontario Dept. of Lands and Forests, advises that where branches have been broken, the best remedy is to cut straight across the limb with a pruning saw, and apply paint or some other suitable material to the exposed stump.

If this is not done, disease can enter a tree through the wound he says. Trees split by the storm can be given support by binding with rope or wire, depending on the size of the trunk. In the case of old tall trees which have lost their tops, the effort of saving them is usually not worth while, he advises. Where trees and branches have been bent, hosing down or shaking will help get rid of the ice, and the tree will almost certainly grow straight again of its own accord, says Mr. Hummel.
