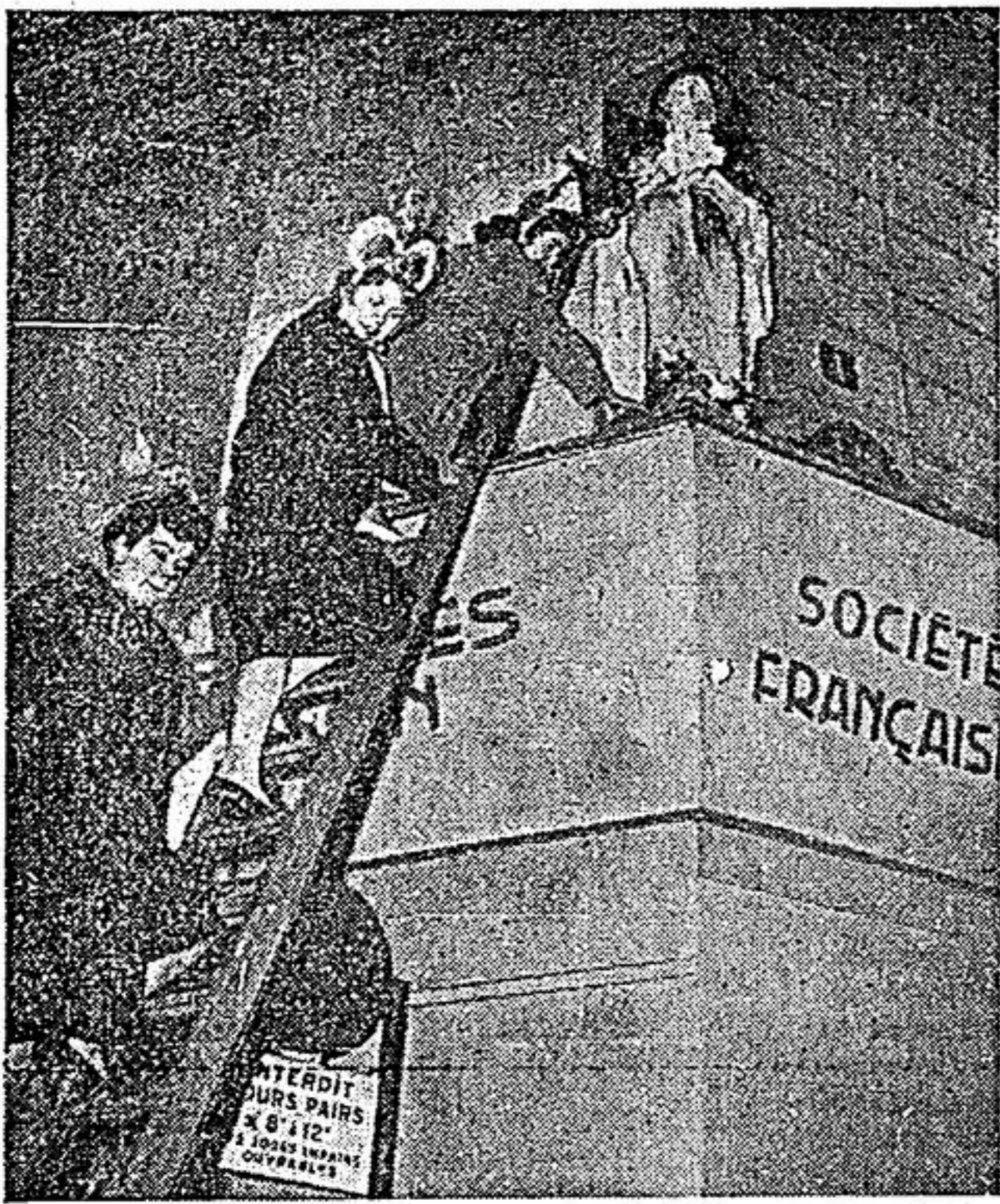
Seamstresses gather around to admire an appropriate hat worn by a co-worker.

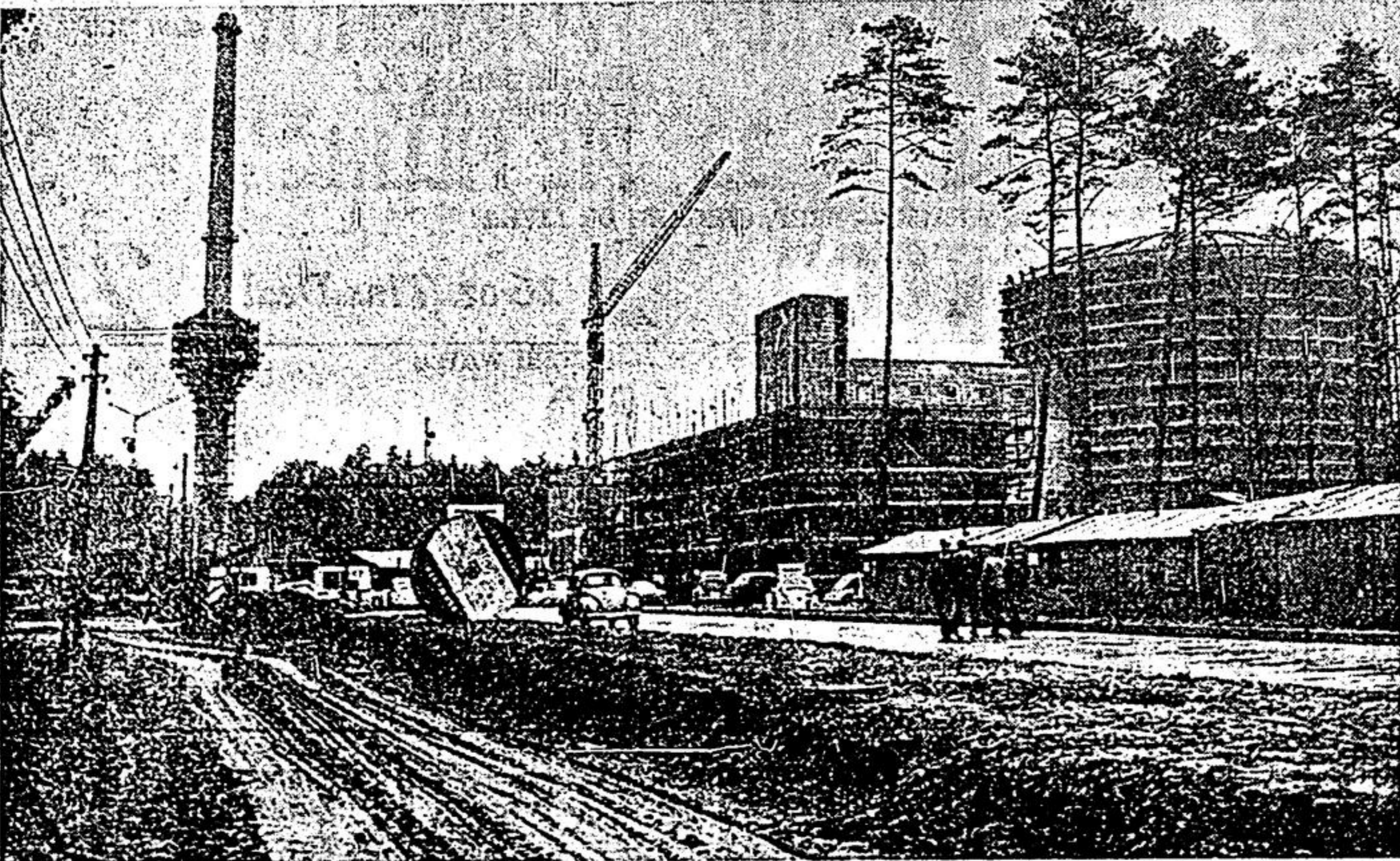

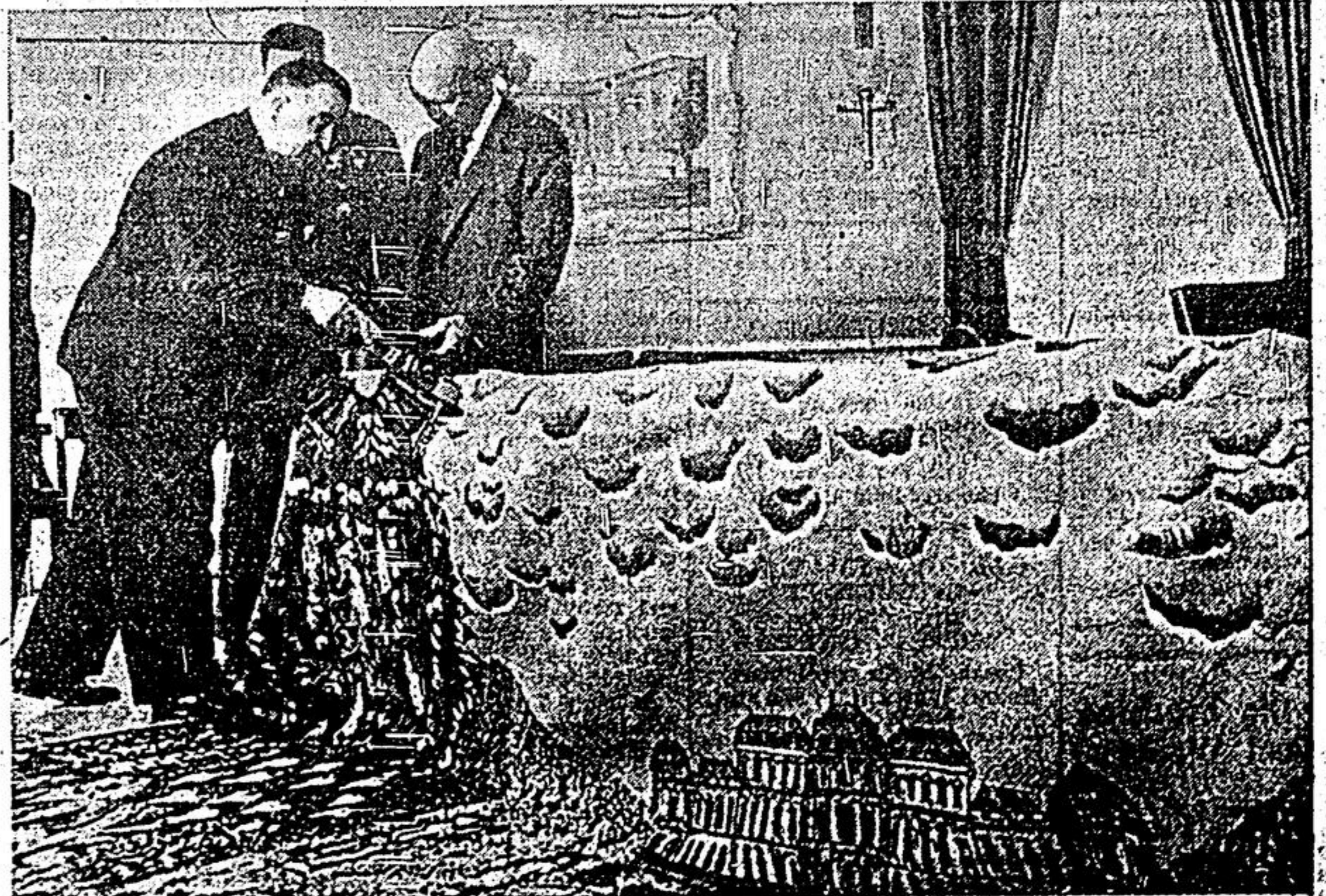
