# Drownings

More than 300 residents of Ontario lost their lives by drowning during 1959. Of these fatalities, 55 were as a direct result of boating mishaps, 5 involved canoes, 17 resulted from falling overboard into water and 9 were caused by leaky, unworthy watercraft .


