Markham Committees

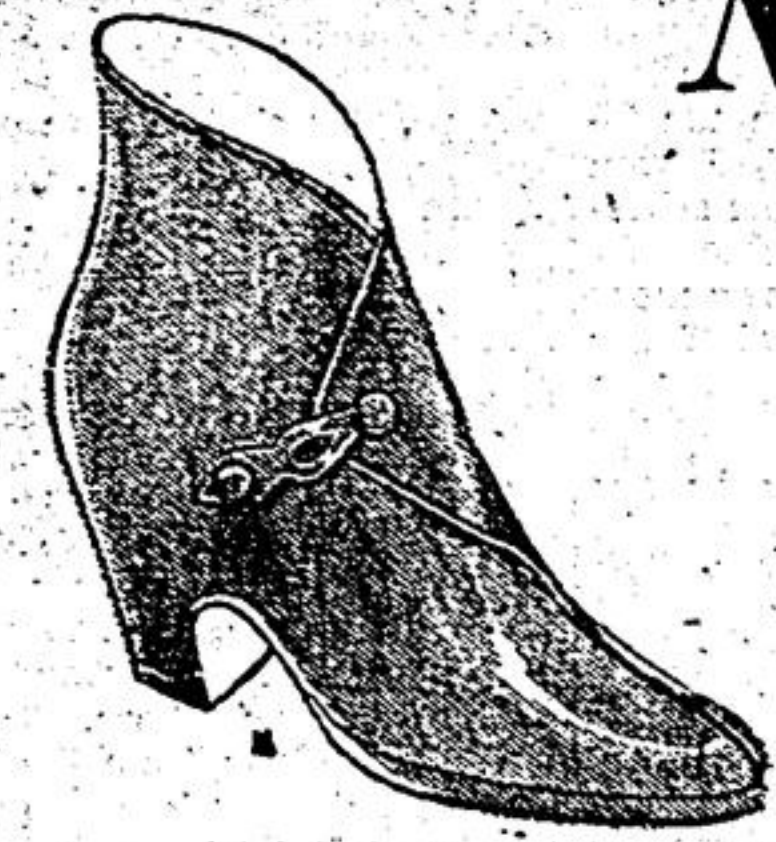

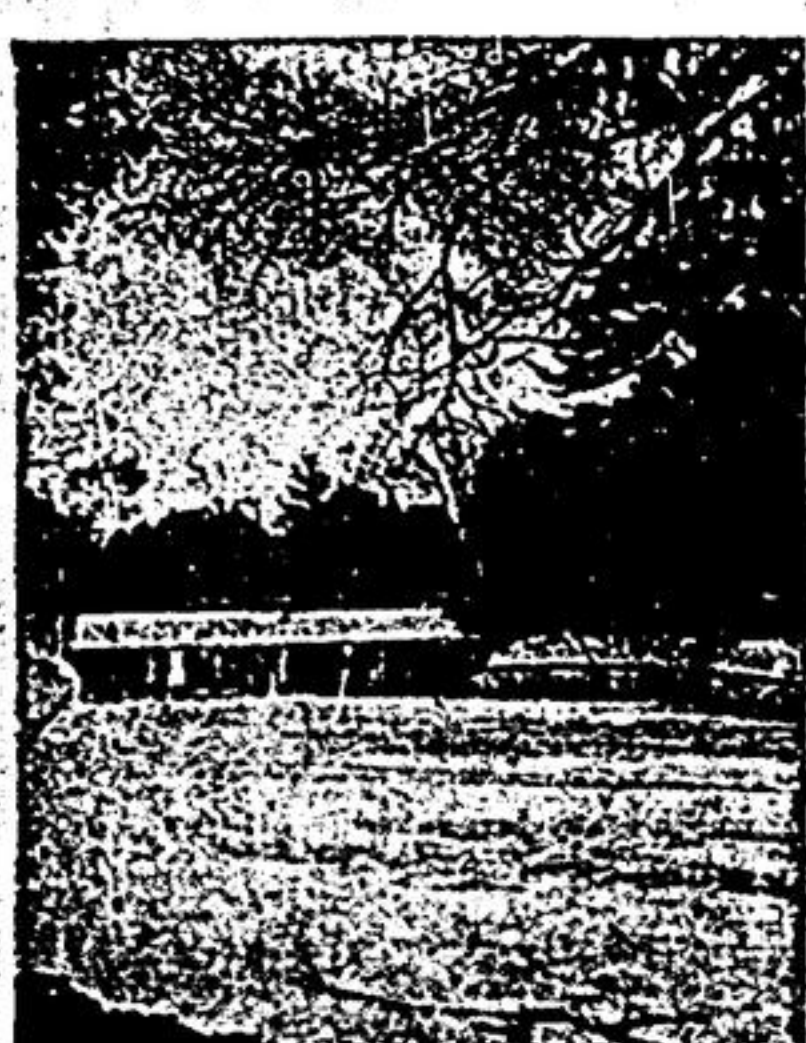

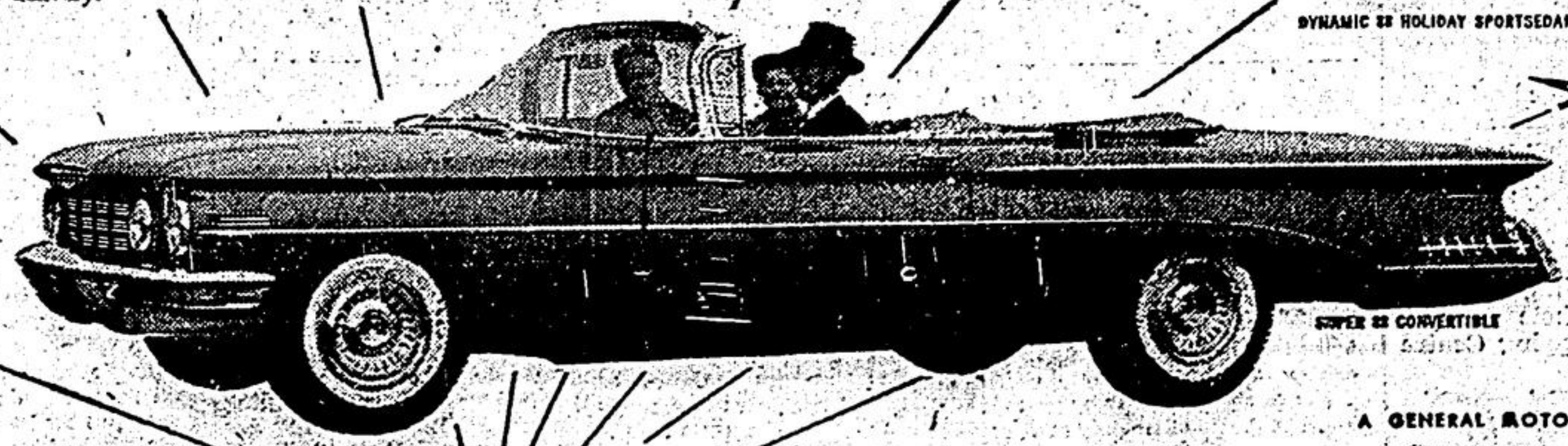
