Mrs. Horace Walsh, Church St., Stouffville, who has been in poor health for some time, passed away in Uxbridge Hospital Wednesday night. Mrs. Walsh had been in hospital a number of times within the last few days but had been preparing to come home when she was suddenly taken.

The former Hazel Irene Forsyth, she was born in Pickering 68 years ago. Mr. and Mrs. Walsh had resided in Toronto for a number of years, prior to moving to Stouffville 22 years ago. Deceased attended Stouffville United Church and was active in the women's organizations. Mrs. Walsh was a daughter of Lyman and Stella Forsyth of Uxbridge Twp.

Besides her husband, she is survived by four daughters, Mrs. A. W. Sutherland, Los Angeles; Mrs. Grant Turner, Stouffville; Mrs. R. L. Gow, and Mrs. F. H. Nott, Toronto; and one son, Cpl. Ronald Walsh, Camp Shilo, Man. One brother, Ray Forsyth, Toronto, also survives. There are also 12 grandchildren and one great-granddaughter in California.

The funeral was conducted by Rev. Douglas Davis from O'Neill's Funeral Chapel on Saturday, and interment was made in Uxbridge Cemetery.

### Fine Gift For School

Nearly five hundred Ontario High Schools, including Stouffville, will share an unprecedented million-dollar gift to Canadian education, announced recently by Charles L. Sims, Frederick, president of the Canadian School Trustees' Association.

The gift is being made by Encyclopedia Britannica of Canada Ltd. Termining the donation of a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica to every qualified high school in Canada. "The largest single contribution ever made to secondary education in this country," Mr. Sims said that over the next few weeks more than 1600 sets of the latest edition of the authoritative Britannica would be going into the libraries of English-speaking high schools, including private schools, from coast to coast. Later, sets will be presented to those French-speaking schools which would like to have it.

The sets will be presented by the chairmen of local school boards or equivalent bodies. Presentations will be made in metropolitan centres in the name of each school's first principal, and in smaller centres in the name of the person deemed to have done most for the community.

"The sheer logistics of the gift are breath-taking," Mr. Sims told a meeting of leading educators and press representatives. "Since the sets are to be replaced on a regular basis, the retail value of the donation is well over one million dollars. More than one thousand local school boards are involved in presentations to the 1600-odd schools with a total enrolment of an estimated 650,000 pupils."
