Mr. Hendricks also asked if council could advance some of the 1960 levy to the Board as they ran out of money early in the year. Reeve Lehman replied, "We on council do, too, and we will be borrowing until the first tax money comes in."

Councillor Laushway said, "That fee is to pay for things on which the municipality gets no grant—it would be foolish to use it, even if we could, to pay school costs, as the government would only cut off the grant on that amount, and the municipality, in turn, would have to debenture for the things which this lot money would otherwise have paid for."

Henry Ogden, chairman of the planning board, said that the new homes were not erected or occupied as quickly as the subdividers anticipated, and he doubted if there would be any 128 families added this year.

Mr. Hendricks said he thought the meeting had been very profitable. He stated that he believed it would be wise if the school board had knowledge of new plans as soon as they came to planning board's attention.

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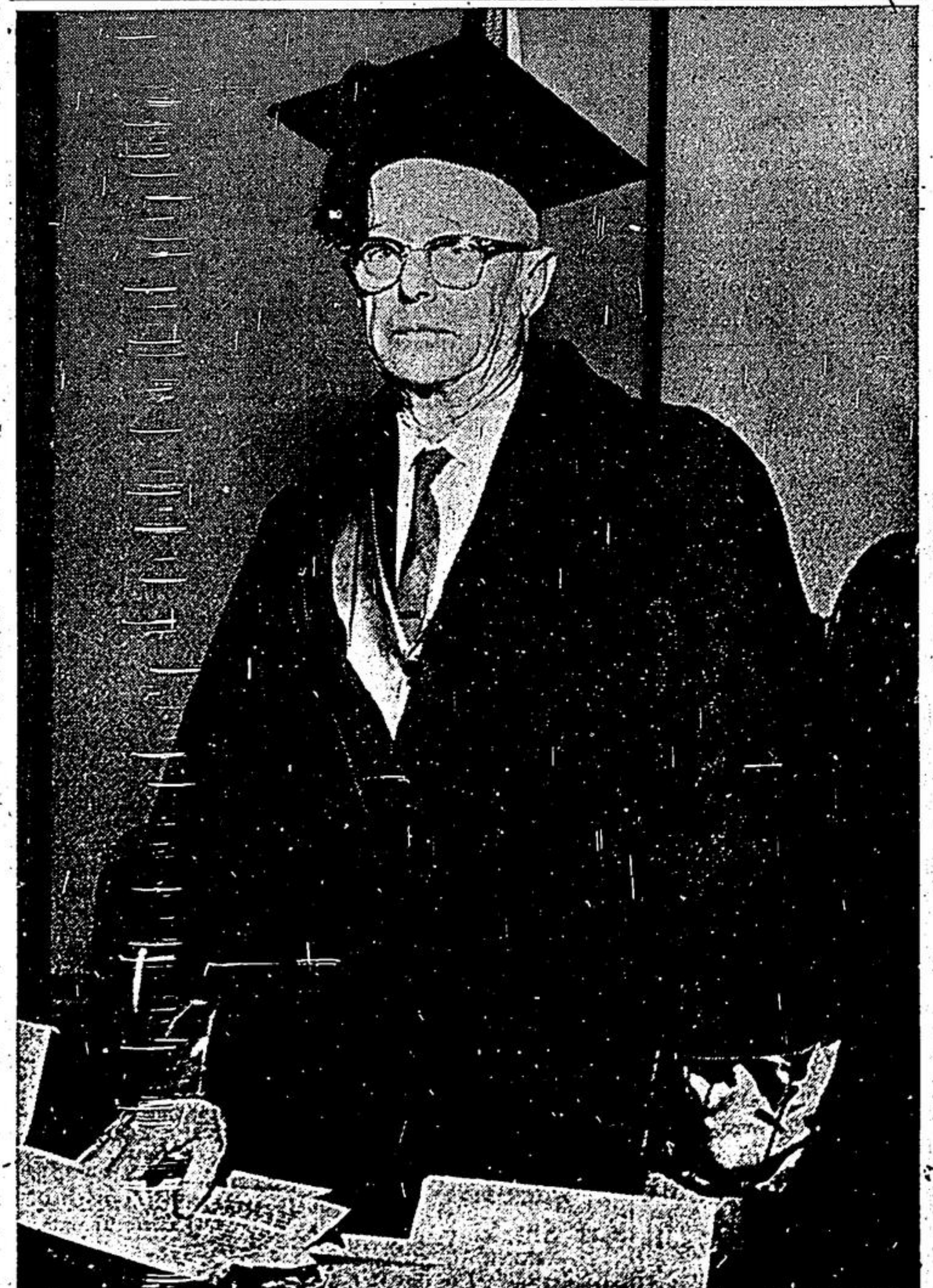
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Reeve Wm. Clark of Markham Township is pictured here in the formal Warden's
