tax money comes in." Councillor Laushway said, "That fee is to pay for things on which the municipality gets no grant - it would be foolish to use it, even if we could, to pay school costs, as the government would only cut off the grant on that amount, and the municipality, in turn, would have to debenture for the things which this lot money would otherwise have paid for."


