York Now A Brucellosis Certified Area

Cattle owners of York County will be pleased to learn that the county has just been declared a Brucellosis Certified Area by the Health of Animals Branch of the Canada Department of Agriculture, according to information just received from Agricultural Representative, W. M. Cockburn, at Newmarket. While the official release has not been issued, Dr. Spence of the Toronto District office, phoned Mr. Cockburn so the good news he had received by wire from Ottawa, could be passed along to the cattle owners, veterinarians and others so anxiously waiting the outcome of the area test.

Anticipating a tightening up of U.S.A. import health regulations two years ago, our Ag. Rep. enlisted the co-operation of the Federation of Agriculture, breed clubs and others, to organize a canvass of York County cattle owners for an area blood test for Brucellosis (bovine abortion). Testing began in December of 1958, with some 16½% reactors in the first general test of the 53,400 head in the county. By repeated retests in infected herds, the percentage of reactors has been reduced to the requirements of a Certified Area.
