

ing Township ratepayers are being asked to subsidize the Authority especially as regards housing on Conservation areas. tor appearing in your issue of These subsidized Conservation

areas are also in direct competition with many parks being operated by taxpayers of the Township who are paying taxes on land and buildings plus a business tax, and in effect these taxpayers are being asked to subsidize their competition.

I believe that the principle of Conservation Areas is good and I believe that the time to acquire them is now, but there is some danger of Pickering Township becoming the focal point of many of the services for Metro Toronto -by this I mean that Pickering is being dissected by Railroads, Access Highways and Power lines, and these services in themselves will remove many thousands of, acres of the Township from ultimate development and if Pickering is to let many additional hundreds or even thousands of acres of land, which someday would be capable of attracting better than average housing, be converted to Parks primarily for other than local use, then this should be done at no additional cost to the

Township. I am not opposed to the Greenwood Conservation Area and I am also well aware that a large number of local people including myself make use of its facilities, and because of this I am quite willing to see the Township provide road maintenance, etc., to this area but, in my opinion, until provision is made regarding the points I have raised, no further Conservation areas are required in rural areas of Pickering Township.

In conclusion. Mr. Editor, if The Marauders Stouffville or any other municipality wishes to have a Conservation area, established within their boundaries for the use of their neighbours, they will have my wholehearted support. Thank you for this opportun-

ity of stating my views.

C. B. Hopkins Passes at Midland

A well-known and respected Midlander, Cecil B. Hopkins, died suddenly at his home, 242 Russell St., Jan. 12. He was m his 79th year.

Funeral service was conducted by Rev. Wilson Morden and Rev. Walter Auld, in St. Paul's United Church, Jan. 14. Born in Vaughan Township, Sept. 26, 1881, the son of Wm. Hopkins and Ellen Cooper, Mr. Hopkins was educated in Glen Major and Claremont. He came to Midland at the age of 17. He was a lifelong bachelor.

An elder, a Sunday School teacher and a leader of boys' work in the St. Paul's United Church, Mr. Hopkins was also a charter member of the Midland branch of the Y.M.C.A., and for over 25 years was recording secretary of the YMCA camp. He was keenly interested in, and tolerant of, teen-agers.

His former minister, Mr. Anuld paid warm tribute to his lifelong devotion and service in counselling the young, and expressed the church's recognition of his useful life. Affectionately referring to him

as "Pop," many of his boys of other years attended Mr. Hopkins' funeral to pay tribute to one who had had a good influence on their lives. Among his many interests,

Mr. Hopkins numbered Huronia Museum, of whose committee he was a charter member. His contributions were extensive, especially in the natural history and geology departments.
