Pickering Girl Awarded \$14,500; Injured at Fair

4-year-old Pickering girl, Lynda Lee Disney, injured by a starting gate while watching a trotting race sponsored by the Uxbridge Kinsmen Club, has been awarded \$14,500 as settlement of her claim.

Mr. Justice Danis of the Supreme Court of Ontario approved the settlement. Lawrence V. Disney of Christina St., Pickering, her father, receives an additional \$1,306 to cover medical expenses.

The girl was standing on a railing in the Uxbridge Municipal Fairgrounds, in May, 1958, when she was struck in the forehead by a moving starting gate fastened to the rear of a car.

Doctors inserted a metal plate in the girl's forehead. She has a four-inch scar.

Defendants were the Uxbridge Kinsmen Club and 12 members. They were — Ernie Brown, Emerson Vance, Roland Hudson, Ray Laswick, Tim Brethour, John Angell, Bill Low, Clarence Johnston, Edward Lee, Ross Murray, Howard Reynolds and Frank Shortt.

Uxbridge Employees Ask Salary Increase

The Uxbridge Township Assessor and Road Superintendent have asked for salary increases in 1960. Both requests were filed at a regular meeting of Council on Monday afternoon. The Assessor, Mr. Fred Clubine was given an increase of \$200, raising his stipend from \$2,000 to \$2,200. This figure also includes \$600 for car allowance. In addition, he will receive \$5.00 for each meeting he attends of the Ontario County Assessor's Association. Mr. Clubine informed Council that he had driven his car more than 600 miles on township business during 1959.

Road Supt. Stan Slack contended that he would like his salary to be on a par with that of officials in neighboring townships. He noted that almost one hundred percent of his time was now consumed by road work. His stipend in 1959 was \$2,000 plus \$300 allowance. Council agreed to deal with the request at a later meeting.
