FAVOUR FACE GUARDS

Although the OMHA has not committed itself on the pros and cons of goaltender face masks, we feel it is a necessary piece of equipment, especially for young lads in Peewee and even Bantam ranks. No boy is a born hockey player, whether he plays on the forward line, on defence or in the net. Some may progress faster than others, but all must go through the same stages of learning. It is regrettable that during this learning stage a boy in the goal must be subjected to possible injury all for the want of a head guard.

Although the majority of peewee performers have some difficulty in lifting the puck off the ice, there are a few exceptions to this rule. It would take only one direct drive or even a deflected shot to injure a lad permanently. No boy or parent can afford to take this risk.

It is with some duress that a coach will coax a young boy to stand between the pipes. He feels some responsibility towards his protegee. Armed with a face guard, the chance of injury would be almost negligible. Only recently, a local sports promoter, Mr. Tat Aida, presented the Stouffville Hockey Association with such a piece of equipment. We hope it is given an honest trial. If successful, more should be purchased.

Solicitors Urge Court House

Members of York County's Law Society, appeared before County Council on Tuesday to recommend that the county establish its own court house rather than pay a share towards Metro's new multi-million dollar court. Jos. Dales, reeve of N. Gwillimbury, was named chairman for the discussion. Jos. Vale of Newmarket was spokesman for the group, assisted by Ab. Hultz, Claire Morrison and Don Hindson.

Mr. Vale pointed out the difficulty existing in making any search at present, of records in Toronto, as they are constantly in use. He also pointed out other difficulties regarding the carrying through of cases once a writ had been issued.

It was stated that the law business in the county was expanding. In 1959, there were 11,406 writs issued, 815 cases went to trial and 785 were settled out of court. This left 900 cases to be carried forward into 1960. In regards to time, it was stated that it often required a year from the time of issuing a writ, before the case was settled.

Warden Clark stated that a Committee of Council members would be set up in the near future to study the situation and make recommendations. Mr. Vale stated that the Law Society would be pleased to appoint a member to sit in on any Committee.

(Q) "Is Leukemia increasing? I have read that X-rays can produce this disease. Is this true?"
U. A. C.

(A) Leukemia, a cancer of white blood cells, has steadily increased in the past 30 years. This is not easily explained. However, these factors are felt to be at least partially responsible:

First, the increase of man-made additions to the natural environmental background radiation. Atomic bomb explosions account for most of this.

Second, use of medication that depresses the bone marrow. Several drugs in use can do this—another reason why medicine should never be taken without good reason.

Third, possible contamination of the atmosphere with chemicals which might cause leukemia.

These factors, as well as others associated with our changing standard of living, deserve further investigation to determine the exact cause of leukemia.

(Q) "I am 14 years old and have blackheads and acne on my face. I was told this would clear when I am 16 or 17. I'd like to get some help now since this is not so good for my social life."

(A) As is so often the case you have been misinformed about your skin problem, since it does not always clear spontaneously in the late teens. In mild cases this may be so but the majority have to use some form of treatment to get relief.

Care of acne and blackheads is difficult. Have your parents take you to a skin specialist. In the meantime; don't apply any medication, pick at the blackheads or use a wash rag or brush on your face because you can aggravate the condition.

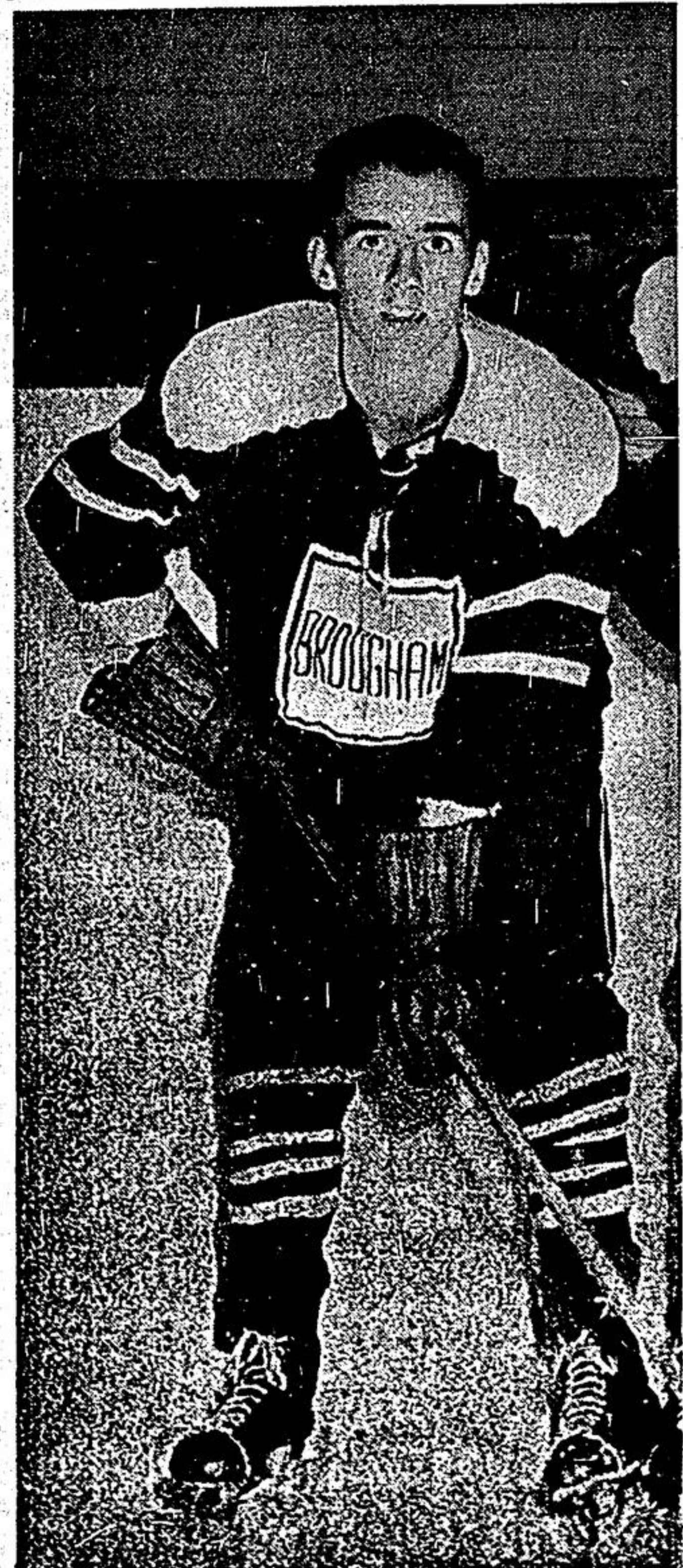
