The MTRCA administers the watersheds of the Etobicoke Creek, Mimico Creek, New Toronto Creek, Humber River, Don River, Rouge River, Highland Creek, Duffin's Creek and Petticoat Creek lying within a 950square mile area. The Authority is principally concerned with flood control, and presently is awaiting provincial government approval of its massive \$34,000,-000 flood control program for the entire region.




