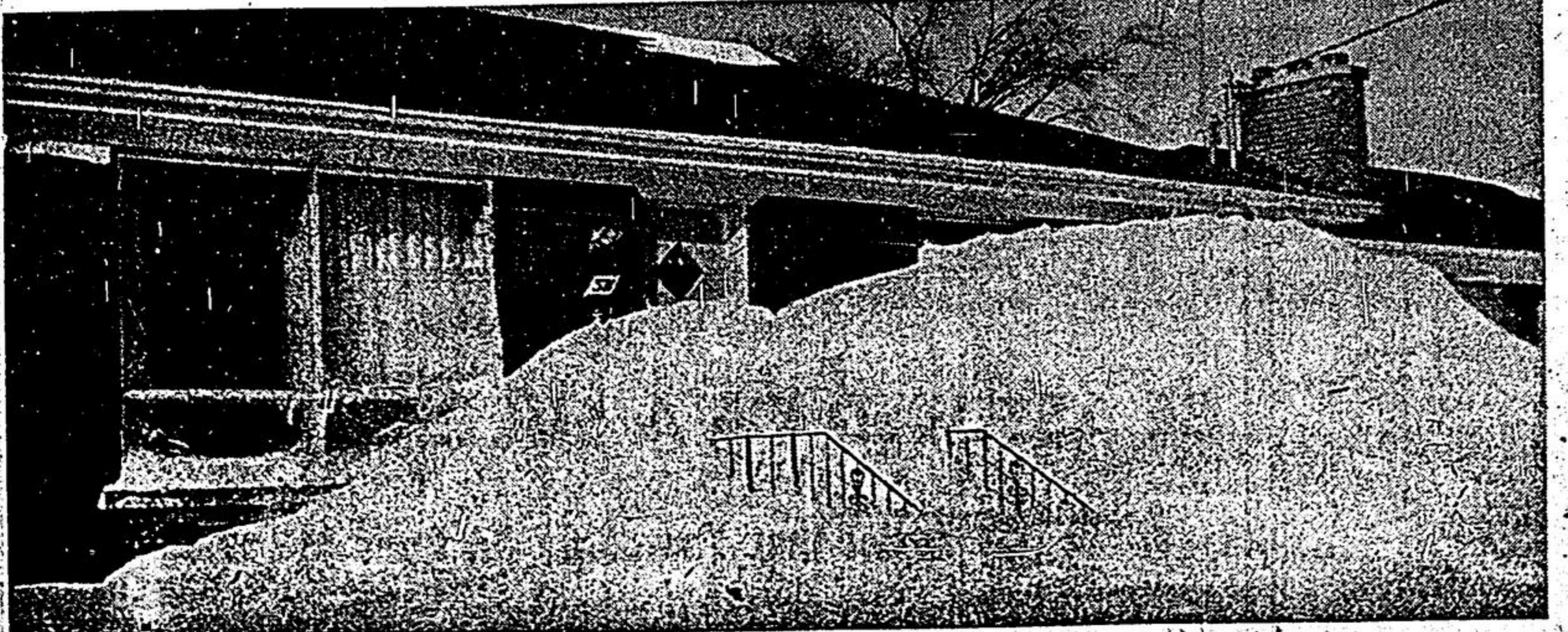


## No Favourites
