York County Seed Fair March 16

The Soil & Crop Improvement Association recently mailed out about one thousand prize lists for their 24th annual York County Seed Fair to be held in Newmarket Town Hall on Wednesday, March 16th. It is interesting to note that this year it has been listed as a Seed Fair and Hay Show because of the extended classes for hay of first or second crops cured in various ways.

The ten bushel classes for registered seed grain have been dropped as well as the seed auction.

Guest speaker for this year is W. P. Watson, Livestock Commissioner of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

Secretary W. M. Cockburn reports the first entries for the Fair came in last week.

Shelve Civil Defence For the Present

No action was taken by York County Council last week on the matter of Civil Defence, but the Warden stated that the matter would be brought forward at a later date.

Mr. Pearce of the Ontario Civil Defence Dept. spoke to council on the advisability of setting up a unit for the county. He considered the first operation of the appointment of a Co-ordinator and he stated that in his opinion it was a full-time job. The Dominion Government pay 75% of the expense, the Provincial Government 15% and the municipality the balance.

In the 1959 budget, the county set aside the amount of \$2,000 to provide the finance for any work taken on this year. Mr. Pearce commented that with this amount, the total expenditure of some \$24,000 could be made.

Praise For Fire Brigade

The Fire Brigade of Unlownville was given a pat on the back on Monday when Markham Twp. council was in receipt of a letter from G. A. Thomas stating his appreciation for the brigade responding to a call which he placed. They were there inside of five minutes and prevented possible serious loss.

Councillor Mumberson stated he would like it known that many persons residing both in and out of the township had expressed appreciation for the quick opening of the roads following the big storms. He said that some of the machines had operated for 23 hours without letup.

Boost Bus Rates On Yonge Street

Markham Township council has agreed to the adoption of a 7½¢ per zone charge on the TTC buses operating from Steeles Ave. north to Richmond Hill. Council was advised Monday night that at the present rates, a deficit of \$30,000 could be expected for this year.

The increase to 7½¢ will still not put the line out of the red but will reduce the deficit to \$15,000. A zone fare of 10 cents would be necessary to show a profit.

However, the T.T.C. considered the increase of 100% too drastic and recommends the 7½¢ to which Markham agreed.

DOES YOUR DAIRY BULL COST TOO MUCH?

Keeping a herd sire is surprisingly expensive. But is he too expensive? Maybe this advice from O.A.C.'s Dr. Bruce Stone will help.

Most people try to buy a breeding-age bull (12 to 15 mos.) that will improve the herd. This will cost \$250 to \$350. To feed a bull of this age (weight about 1100 lbs.) you will need nearly 2500 lbs. of hay and 1500 lbs. of grain per year. With hay selling for \$20 a ton and grain \$55 a ton, total annual feed costs including concentrate would be \$85 to \$100.

Cost of bedding, housing and veterinary service will vary, but an average figure would be \$50. Labour costs are similar. For the total annual cost of keeping a herd sire you should figure interest on your money plus depreciation, which would bring the figure to nearly \$250.

With an average-sized herd in Ontario (25 to 30 cows), service from such a bull would cost \$8.50 to \$10. Compare this to the artificial service fee of \$5.

"A saving of \$90 to \$150 can be made by using entirely A.I. on an average-sized herd," concludes Stone. The break-even point seems to be at the 45 to 50 cow level.

"There's another consideration," says Stone. "For a little extra feed and labour and about the same housing costs, you can replace the bull with a milk cow which should make you about \$50.

COOLING AND STORING CAKES
As soon as a butter-type cake is done, remove it from the oven and place the pan on a cake rack, advises the Home Economics Service of the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture. Allow the cake to cool in the pan for ten minutes, then loosen it from the sides of the pan with a spatula and turn it out on the cake rack. Remove the paper from the bottom of the cake and finish cooling it, right side up.

Fruit cakes should be left in pans until 'cold,' as they are heavy, yet tender when hot. Immediately after removing a sponge-type cake from the oven, turn the pan upside-down, leaving an air space between the pan and the table top. Do not disturb until cake is cool. Never cut cake when hot. Cakes may be stored in a covered tin or may be covered and stored in the refrigerator.

Pumping Station In Order Says Dep. Reeve

Dep. Reeve, Robt. Nesbitt of Uxbridge Township has quashed a recent rumor in the Goodwood area which suggested that the hamlet's pumping station was not in satisfactory working order. The pump was installed as a co-operative project between the township and the Conservation Authority to solve the annual spring flood problem that has plagued residents in the district for many years.

"I can assure anyone that if the pump was needed today, it would operate," said the Deputy Reeve. He noted that it was used during the spring of 1959. He agreed, however, that some repairs would have to be made to the system. "It's pretty difficult to test it when there is no water available," he said. He suggested that the pump might possibly be put to good use if a sudden thaw should hit the area.

Pass Exemption By-law

Stouffville municipal council at the last regular meeting passed the annual exemption bylaw, which exempts to a specified percentage, the farm lands of certain ratepayers, and which farm lands are included within the boundaries of the municipality.

Six residents are owners of farm land of more than five acres each, two less than in 1959. Both the C. E. Watson property and the Toole property on Stouffer Street are no longer exempt.

Mrs. Ed. Williams, F. Vivian, Agnes Lewis and A. E. Booth, are exempt 65% for sewer tax on the farm land; Margaret Woods is exempt 60% and Walter Chmielewsky 50%. The reason for the difference in exemptions is that certain of these lands are more accessible to sewers than others.
