# Local Teachers Attend Educational Conference

Members of the staff of the  
Stouffville District High School  
met for the annual Educational  
Conference of York Ontario Dis-  
trict on Thursday, Feb. 25. Guest  
speaker at the noon luncheon  
was Mr. R. H. Wallace, an As-  
sistant Superintendent of Sec-  
ondary Schools Branch of the  
Department of Education for  
the Province of Ontario.

Mr. Wallace stressed the need  
for scholarship on the part of  
the teachers and a sense of dis-  
crimination among values in our  
society today. He felt that there  
was no need to continue the cult  
of mediocrity which exists among  
people today.

Mr. A. H. McKague of the De-  
partment of Education discussed  
the work of the Department in  
Educational Research. It was  
their hope that something  
can be accomplished toward  
achieving an increase in the per-  
centage of students securing a  
Grade XII Graduation diploma.  
Mr. McKague explained that ob-  
jective testing in Grade XIII  
was being tried on an experi-  
mental basis as an economy  
measure this year.

The Grade XII programme of  
objective testing was intended  
to assist teachers to establish  
some set of standards which  
would be more or less uniform  
throughout the Province.  
Special attention was given in  
discussion groups to promotion

standards, to the importance of  
science courses, and to stream-  
ing of students and terminal  
classes.  
Mr. David McDuff of Done-  
van Collegiate is Chairman of  
the Professional Development  
Committee which arranged the  
excellent Conference.
