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W. M. "Moff" Cockburn To Retire as Ag. Rep. After 37 Yrs.

A most popular gentleman, and Agricultural Representative of York County for the past 24 years, W. M. "Moff" Cockburn will retire from office this spring. Mr. Cockburn has given 37 years service to the Department of Agriculture. His successor has not yet been named.

Mr. Cockburn has been agricultural representative locally since 1936, although he first came to York County in 1923 as an assistant. The following year he went to Simcoe County, and then to Alberta to teach at the Agricultural College. In 1928 he returned to Ontario to Carleton County.

Last year Mr. Cockburn was honored by being made a Fellow of the Agricultural Institute of Canada for his outstanding contribution to agriculture.

Mr. Cockburn takes pride in the work of his office in helping to develop the cold storage facilities at the Holland Marsh. He was instrumental in having the OAC buy 9½ acres of marsh-



land near highway 400 to carry on experimental work in marsh growing. "The tests can be done only under exactly the same conditions as prevail in the marsh," Mr. Cockburn said, "and there is no use in trying to take the soil somewhere else to experiment."

He also helped to introduce the artificial insemination program into county herds and has given leadership in the various breeds clubs, particularly in dairy cattle. This week he recalled the various other campaigns among stock, the TB canvass undertaken just before his arrival in 1936, the warble fly control work, and more recently when York county was declared a certified area for brucellosis.

Mr. Cockburn was born at Aberfoyle, Ontario in 1895. He married a girl from his home town, Isobel Moore. They have three sons, Gordon of Willowdale, Donald and Douglas of Newmarket and six grandchildren.

Birthday greetings were extended to Mrs. J. Winterstein and Mrs. E. Lemon.

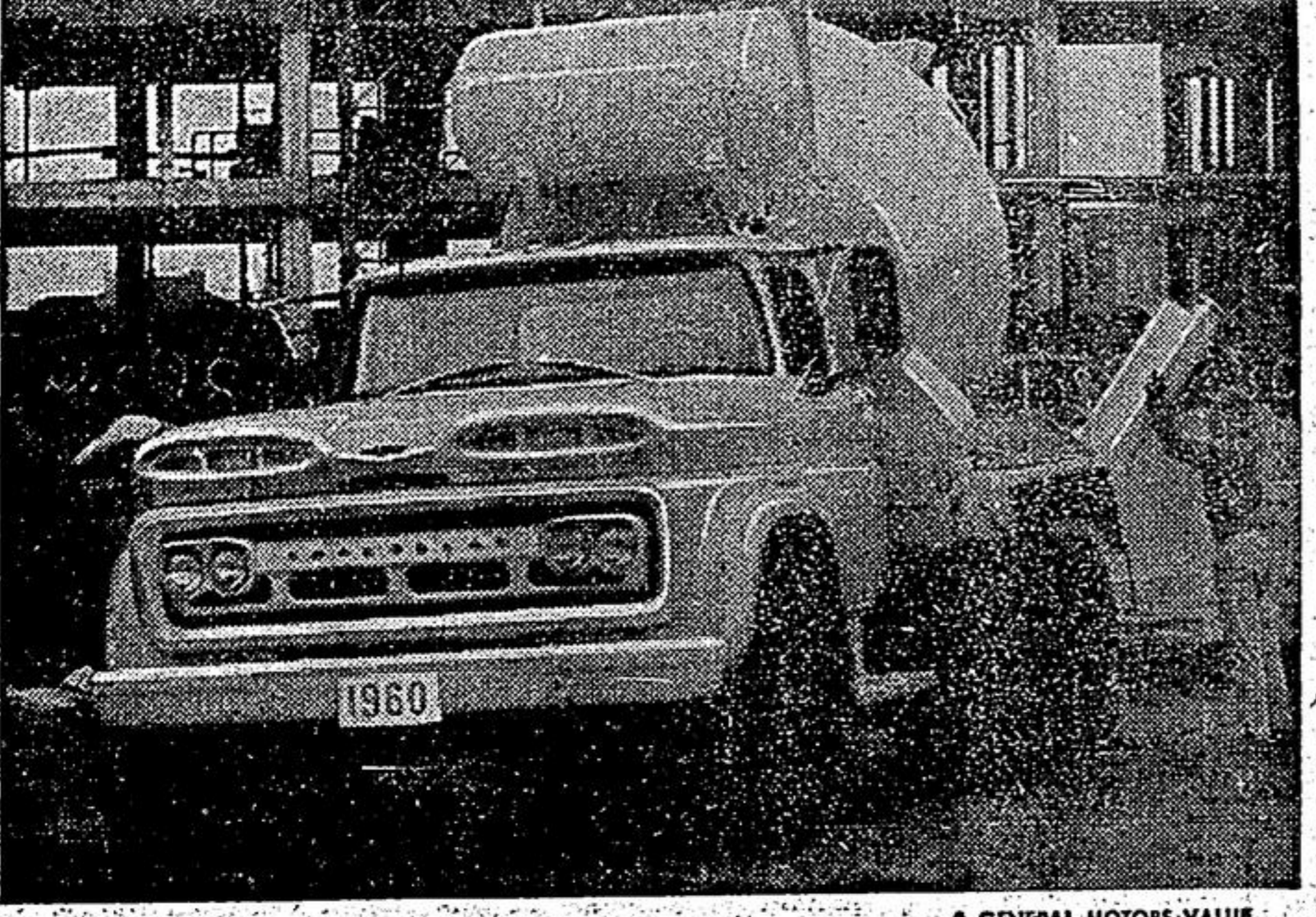

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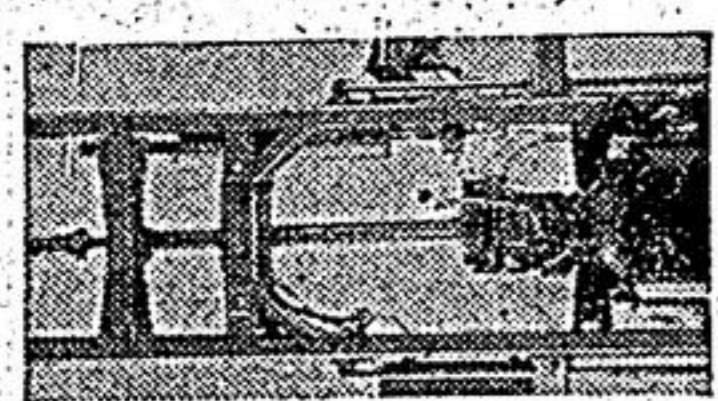
