# Uxbridge Snow Removal

**Costs Over \$17,000 — Will Go Still Higher**  
The cost of snow removal during the months of January and February in the Township of Uxbridge is over \$17,000. This figure was revealed at a regular meeting of Council on Monday afternoon. Additional bills are still to come in, according to the Road Supt., Mr. Stan Slack. Expenditures during the month of March are not included in the total. In February, a total of \$10,556.85 was paid out in the rental of privately-owned bulldozers and shovels. The largest fee was collected by York Sand and Gravel for \$3,982.50. An additional \$1,768.00 was paid to Mr. L. J. Kydd; \$1,697.35 to Hayhoe Construction Co. and \$1,552.50 to Stouffville Sand and Gravel Co. Smaller amounts went to Mel Emmerson, Western Sand and Gravel, Earl Henderson and Walter Beach. The road account for February totalled \$15,206.05. "We wouldn't want that kind of an account for twelve months of the year," commented Reeve, Earl Dowswell. Road Superintendent, Slack told the meeting that a number of township employees had put in up to fifteen and eighteen hours per day during the height of the snow-removal campaign.

# Salaries of Markham Office Staff Range From \$2,400 to \$7,500

The salary schedule for the office staff of the Township of Markham has been set up and approved by Council. The members agreed to the new scale at a regular meeting on Monday night. The present staff will rank as follows: Office clerk (general) \$2,400; Receptionist and typist, \$2,760; Accounting clerk, \$3,500; Stenographer and secretary, \$2,880; Stockkeeper (road dept.), \$3,840; Assistant Road Supt., \$4,600; Assessor, \$4,000; Assessor (longer service), \$4,800; Waterworks Supt., \$4,200; Dep.-Treasurer, \$4,600; Road Supt., \$5,000; Assessment Commissioner, \$6,000; Bldg. Inspector, \$5,520; Planning Director, \$6,000; Clerk-Treasurer, Tax collector and Office Mgr., \$7,500. Six township employees are now in the maximum salary class. The salary schedule for the Road Department is as follows: Grader operator, \$1.65 per hour; Truck operator, \$1.40 per hour; Labourer (class A.), \$1.40 per hour; Labourer (class B.), \$1.25 per hour.
