### University a Burden On Taxpayer, Claims Markham Deputy-Reeve

A suggestion by York County within the County has not been enthusiastically received by Salary in Line members of Markham Twp. Council. Each municipality within the County has been asked to submit information with regard to desirable sites.

Deputy-Reeve Wilfred Dean charged that in Ward 1 there were already too many nonrevenue - producing properties and any more would only constitute an additional burden on the taxpayers. A university is tax exempt.

Councillor McNeil said that there had been some talk that the Langstaff Jail Farm property contained sufficient land to accommodate the University buildings. The site contains 700 acres but only 400 acres are required.

Reeve Wm. Clark stated that the matter had never been referred to the Township Planning Board. Council agreed that the area selected would have to provide sufficient housing accommodation to look after the needs of students not in resi-
