Bill LeBrash fired the lone goal for Campbellford. Following the contest, the generous Campbellford hosts treated the local team to refreshments at a Main Street restaurant.

"The natural ice in the Campbellford Arena held up quite well throughout the entire contest. It appeared to become sticky in the late stages of the final frame. Centreman, Roger Forsyth was sidelined in the second period with a deep cut on his right hand. He collided head-on with a Campbellford defenceman and fell heavily to the ice. No penalty was called on that play. It is expected he will be back in the lineup for the final series. Glenn Jackson played well in the Stouffville net. He pulled off an amazing stop on Campbellford's Bill LeBrash in the third period when the forward roared in on a clean-cut breakaway. The save appeared to be a turning point in the game.

## Brawl Halts Community League Playoff Game; B. Cherry Scores On Penalty Shot

Claremont Wins 8-6

A torrid Community League hockey game was transformed into a tag team wrestling match on Tuesday night as Stouffville and Claremont players engaged in a mid-ice free-for-all. The brawl broke out in the dying seconds of the group championship playoff opener. The officials, Hal Gibson and Polly Minton immediately halted the match. Claremont claimed the victory by a score of 8-6.

Referee Minton ordered a penalty shot after he claimed Stouffville forward, Howard Forgie had thrown his stick at Claremont's Bob Cherry as he steamed in on the net. Team mate, Ray Pipher was tagged with a ten minute misconduct penalty when he questioned the official's ruling. Howard Forgie suffered a similar fate and was later thumbed from the game when he continued his protest. Bob Cherry romped in the Stouffville net and flipped the puck into the corner.

The tally touched off an outbreak of physical violence. Stouffville netminder, Geo. Martin cross-checked forward Bob Cherry. Brother Jim Cherry retaliated. Defenceman Geo. Third joined the fray but was partially disrobed in the melee. Claremont goalie, Wes Evans completed a thirty yard dash into the very centre of the skirmish to add to the confusion. Netminder Martin, after clipping a few rivals with some well-placed jabs, was pinned for the ten count by rival puck-stopper, Evans. Vern Ferguson, a usually mild-mannered performer was also involved, but his adversary is yet unknown. Howard Forgie, although ejected from the contest a few minutes earlier, returned to the ice to watch the proceedings from a ring-side seat. Other players milled around in the fight zone but none seemed particularly anxious to become involved in the non-title bout. Gloves, sticks and sweaters were littered about the ice. Peace and quiet was finally restored when coaches, Loyd Pascoe of Claremont and Don Gibson of Stouffville herded their proteges into their respective dressing rooms. The series will resume on Tuesday night of next week at 8:15 p.m. It is a best 3 out of 5 games. Claremont now holds a one game edge.

Although the fisticuffs was the feature performance on the night's card, the hockey action was packed with excitement from the opening whistle. At one point in the contest, Stouffville held a 6-3 lead. In the second and third periods, Claremont rallied to fire five-in-a-row. Jim Cherry netted three. Singles came from the sticks of Dean Evans, Stan Benson, Jack Redshaw, Vern Ferguson and Bob Cherry. Harry Young scored a pair for the "Merchants". Linde Borean, Bill Allan, Howard Forgie and Ron Graham notched the others. Claremont outshot Stouffville 37 to 30.

Jack Redshaw turned in his best game of the season for Claremont. His goal, his team's first of the night was a picture effort. Vern Ferguson and Grant Jones played up to their usual form. Ron Graham and Harry Young were effective for Stouffville. Bill Allan, Stouffville rightwinger suffered a leg injury late in the first period and his absence from the lineup hurt the "Merchants'." changes.
