





Water tower at left was once a prison. Now it houses Swiss Artillery club.




BRIDGE

CPANNING the past, a Ocovered bridge in Luceine, Switzerland; serves as an art gallery with paintings of the nation's past. The bridge, which extends over the Reuss river, was constructed in 1333. At each of the bridge's 50 wooden arches are triangular paintings depicting the early growth of Switzerland. The bridge and the artworks, which were painted in ' the early 17th century, are under the protection of the Municipal museum of Lucerne. Except during occasional restoration work, the paintings remain in place all year around, no matter what the weather. Pedestrians get the feeling-they are inside a museum as they stroll across. Periodic work keeps the paintings in top condition.





