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Minor Title Evades Local Midget Team For Third Season In Succession

Ridgetown Rally Claims 3-2 Win

For the third successive season, a Stouffville minor hockey team has advanced to the Ontario finals. For the third successive season, the coveted title has eluded their grasp. On Thursday night, before the hilarious cheers of over 200 partisan supporters, captain John Mickle of Ridgetown Midgets was presented with the Dr. Roger Matchett Trophy by Mr. Gordon Hawes of Whitby, an Executive Member of the Ontario Minor Hockey Association. In sharp contrast, fifteen Stouffville players and 700 fans looked on in sombre dis- R. Corner, Buffalo appointment. Perspiration, mixed with tears, stained the faces of some local boys. In an excellent display of good sportsmanship, they were quick to offer handshakes to their. jubilant victors immediately following the final whistle.

It had been a similar story last year and again in the season of '57-'58. Two Bantam teams and this year's Midget entry had successfully bested some of the top clubs in the Province. With the end of the championship road in sight, they had crashed head-on into strong contenders in Shallow Lake, Blenheim and this season-Ridgetown. They failed to survive, but on each occasion they displayed admirable courage, even in defeat.

Ridgetown captured the midget crown, the hard way. Not only did they claim the title on foreign ice, but they spotted their rivals a two goal lead, then rallied with three in a row. Dave Foster, John Mickle and Bill Rivers were the marksmen for the new champions. Warren Hendricks and Jim Knox blinked the light for Stouffville. The game-winner, fired by Rivers, came at 7:45 of the final frame. Coach Hal Gibson threw six players into the fray in the final minute with goalie Glenn Jackson sitting on the sidelines. The Ridgetown defences failed to yield. They forced a last-second faceoff in the Stouffville end-zone and netminder Jackson returned to his post for a final stand. At the whistle, the ice surface was transformed into a seething sea of Ridgetown humanity. Their favourites were mobbed. Goalie Bob Myslik was vaulted on top of his mates' shoulders. It was almost fifteen minutes before the excitement waned sufficiently to make the official presentation. The entire Stouffville club remained on the ice during the ceremony.

Change Age Limits in Ontario Baseball Assoc.

Decisions approved at the 42nd annual Ontario Baseball ANDY BELLEMER Association convention held recently, will be of special interest to North York Minor Baseball League clubs.

First and foremost, the delegates voted to revert to the age limits that were changed for the 1959 season.

The limits once again will be: peewee, 13 after May 1; Bantam, 15 after May 1; midget, 17 after 5 14 | May 1; Juvenile, 19 after May

1; junior, 21 after May 1. That means, in effect, a boy who does not become 13 before May 1 of this year will be able 0 10 to play peewee and so on down 7 10 through the other series.

Last season, on a one-year trial basis, the midget series 9 was dropped from the OBA competitions. This year the OBA will again conduct midget series playdowns as well as in peewee, bantam, juvenile, junior, intermediate and senior.

Andy Bellemer of Bala, Ont. 52-year-old former hockey player, coach, manager, and referee, died on Tuesday in hospital following a lengthy illness.

Bellemer turned professional late in the 1920s as a defenseman with Windsor and graduated to the National Hockey League in 1932 with the Montreal Maroons for part of the

From the Maroons, he hit the hockey trail with such clubs as Windsor, Cleveland, Syracuse, Rochester, Kansas City, Tulsa and Dallas.

Bellemer officiated for many years in the Ontario Hockey Association and for a time coached the Parry Sound Juniors. A year ago, he returned to Windsor Bulldogs where he served as coach and manager.

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
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
